A correspondent of the Canada Ear mer, discussing the subject of wheat growing, makes several points which may prove valuable to some of our rea-ders. It is assumed that the best soil for wheat is that in which clay predominates, but to ensure a crop the land must be naturally or artificially drained. Arable land requires for a full development of its resources a crop of fall wheat in the system of rotation. The selecting and preparation of seed wheat is of great importance, yet rarely receives any attention. Seed wheat should be tested by immersion in water, as the imperfect grains wil float on the surface and are thus severed from those suitable for sowing. These floating grains are infested with fungi or parasites, and though light enough to float have still sufficient vitality to germinate and re-produce the pest which diminish the quantity and vitiate the quality of the wheat crop. After the floating grains are removed, turn the water off and give the seed a good coating of lime, which will render innoxious any smut which. may adhere to the wheat. These precautions taken, it is assumed that a crop of clean wheat may be safely relied upon. The suggestion is worthy of trial.

### TO THE PARMERS.

There is perhaps nothing about which our Farmers should exercise more care than in the selection of their Fertilizers and especially is this caution necessary at this time when the market is so full of new and untried articles, many of which are perfectly worthless.

What is needed is a Manure which contains Ammonia and Phosphate of Lime in proper proportions, so that it will act at once upon the growing crop, producing a large yield, and at the same time having such an effect upon the soil

as to be of permanent benefit.

The safest rule in our opinion, for Farmers to pursue is, to use only those articles which have undergone years of trial, and have proven themselves by their action upon the crops to be relia-

The following will no doubt prove interesting to our lady readers:

When you receive a boquet sprinkle it lightly with fresh water; then put it in a vessel containing soap suds; this will nutrify the stem and keep the flowers as bright as new. Take the boquet out of the suds every morning and lay it sideways (the stalk entering first) into clean water. Keep it there a minute or two, then take it out and sprinkle the flowers lightly by the hand with water; replace it in the soap suds, and it will bloom as fresh as when first gathered. The soap suds need changing every three or four days. By observing these rules a boquet may be kept bright and beautiful for at least a month, and will last still longer in a very passable state, but attention of the fair creatures, as directed above, must be observed or all will perish.

RANCID BUTTER. -We cut from an exchange the following recipe: "To a pint of water, add thirty drops (about half a teaspoonfulr of liquor of chloride Wash in this two and a half pounds of rancid butter. When every particle of the butter has come in contact with the water, let it stand an hour or two; then wash the butter well again in pure water. WHITEWASHING TREES.—The practice of coating the bark of fruit and ornamental trees with whitewash is one that connot be too severely deprecated. The obstruction of the perspiratory organs and orifices, whether effected by the application of whitewash or any other adhesive material, always acts as a fruitful source of disease, and in time proves fatal to the tree. When the bark becomes rough or incrusted with moss, it should be cleaned by scraping and washing down thoroughly with a solution of soft soap or soda in water, affording smoothness to the surface without obstructing the pores.

✓A COUPLE OF HINTS.—Those who are

fond of green corn during the winter do not all know that it may be preserved by packing it tightly in casks or barrels and covering it with brine strong enough to keep cucumbers. The corn should be taken with the husks on. Corn thus prepared, if kept covered with brine, will keep in good order for a year or more, and will be sufficiently fresh for table use when boiled.

If you are troubled with rats, put some tar in the entrance of their dwellings, so that they cannot get in or out without coming in contact with it, and my word for it they will not trouble you long.

SALLA LUNN.-Rub three ounces of butter into a pound of flour, then add three eggs beaten very light, a little salt, one gifl of yeast, and as much milk as will make it into a soft dough, Knead it well. Put it in a buttered pan cover it, and set it in a warm place to rise. Bake in a moderate oven and send to take hot. To be eaten with butter.

Gingra-News.-Half a pound of butter, half a pound of sugar, one pint of molasses, two ounces of ginger, half an ounce of ground cloves and alspice mixed, two tablespoonsful of cinnamon, as much flour as will form a dough.— Knead it well, make it out in small cakes, bake them on tins in a very moderate oven. Wash them over with molasses and water before they are put to
