There is no applied that the farmer should be better acquainted with than the character of the different fertilizers which are employed to enrich his soi and increme his crops; simply because they are expensive, and to be useful, should be properly applied. I have been induced to write this article because there is a common error prevalent among farmers that any one of the numerous fertilizers employed is sufficient, and, while Mr. Jones is wedded, in this opinion, to lime Mr. Smith prefers guano, it being a mere matter of fancy after all.

properties.
Silica, although the most abundant, is yet the most difficult constituent of vegctable matter to obtain, from its insoluble nature, while its importance is incal-culable; therefore anything that will digest it, is, of course, one of our most val-uable fertilizers. Silica is an acid, and therefore only combines with alkalies, and of all these, the carbonate of lime is ost useful as a fertilizer to soil, but this
