1st. Greatly increased size. We have known the male to reach from thirty to forty pounds each; and one is spoken of at the recent exhibition of the New York Agricultural Society, which weighed forty-six pounds, making a good Christmas dinner for an ordinary family. Well authenticated accounts speak of single birds having reached fifty-six pounds each.

2d. The bronse turkeys also undoubtedly derive from their wild perentage greatly increased hardiness. Every or who has raised turkeys knows the difficulty of rearing them for the first two months. They are the most helpless of poultry, say up to three months old, suffering in various ways—from sudden changes of weather, from wet grains too early or too late exposure nights and mornings, and also from injudicious feeding. The turkey hen is a very poor nurse, and seems to have far less of the maternal instincts than the common hen. She drags her young after her through high, wet grass, with her long strides frequently crushing one to death but never looking or seeming to care and if on setting out on a morning launt with ten or twelve young ones, she comes back with only one, she does not seem to be the least disconcerned, but takes the matter as coolly as a defeated very little brains, or she would not be so foolish as she is. It is undoubtedly best to confine her for a few weeks after hatching in the yard, or perhaps still better, to raise the brood under a hen. It is generally admitted that the young Bronse turkeys stand many more hardships than the common breed, and much larger per centage are reared. 3d. #### PLASTER OF PARIS.

A correspondent of the Ploughman having asked to be informed of the most proper season of the year for the appli-cation of plaster to pasture lands for renevation; also the best method of applying the same, the quantity per acre necessary for a fair trial, and the quality of land to which it is adapted—the
