one lach deep.
Immediately after planting, before the corn sprouts, out with your compost of ashes and home made guano, and drop from two to four spoonsfull on each hill.

As soon as you can follow the rows nicely, go in and cultivate both ways. All the scare crow you want in the field is—your-self. Thin out to five plants in a hill. When the corn is four or five inches high cultivate and weed and hoe carefully with a hand hoe. Then cultivate as of-ten as once in ten days until it is too large

to drive a home among.
Neverhill corn up; its roots need all the heat of the sun to perfect its growth. As soon as it is in tassel, go through it with the corn knife, and cut all weed close to the ground, so as to let in the air and sun-shine to mature the crop. September 10th to 20th, cut up and put about twenty hills in a shock. October 1st to 15th, husk and crib.

I have in this way raised 1,750 bushels of sound cars on 114 acres, and heavier crops per acre on smaller pieces. Try my method, and report progress in the Rural.-Rural New Yorker.

WHY POTATOES SHOULD BE PARED THIM .- Ascientific writer says: The fact is, almost the sole value of the potato is near the surface, so a thick peel would take the largest part of the nutriment This is at once made obvious by examining a thin slice of potato with a micro-scope, when the starch granules will be found lying in great numbers in a belt just under the skin and decreasing towards the center. They are placed here for the nourishment of the young sprout which springs from the "eye," and which being like beauty, 'only skindeep,' is required to go no deeper for its germinating process. This starch is, for all practical purposes, the entire nutriment which the potato contains—there being only 2 per cent. of gluten while 75 per cent. is clear water. If it is worth while to eat the potato at all, it is obviously foolish to throwsway the nutriment and save only the water cells.

EARLY CULTIVATION OF POTATOES. Much labor may be saved by running a brush harrow over the ground just as the shoots are breaking through. This will distarb the whole surface of the ground, and is equivelent to a good hoeing. A week or ten days later, go between the rows with a cultivator, and if the young shoots are covered deep-ly with dirt, it will not harm them. The early sorts will only need cultivating once or twice more, and this can be done by horse power. Early and frequent cultivation makes cheap potatoes.—Ag-

There are few farms whose average production could not be doubled in a very short time by more capital and labor. It is safer to use capita in farming than in almost any other bus iness. The quantity of grain grown per sere is mainly a question of manure and tillage. A big compost heap makes a full grain bin. With high manuring, the soil needs deeper stirring and a gradual bringing up of the subsoli to the surface. With the present horse harrows and cultivators, nearly all the cultivation can be done by horse power, at a great saving of expense, and a great increase of the crops. Plan for big crops this sea-
