

THE DEMOCRATIC CONSERVATIVE NATIONAL CONVENTION.—The New York World has the following in relation to several delegations in this convention, to meet in this city on the 1st of July:

Iving Hall has been engaged by the State Central Committee of Pennsylvania for the convening of the delegation from the Keystone State, and Masonic Hall will furnish sleeping quarters for the entire Pendleton escort, which is to number over 500 men. The Masonic Hall will congregate at the Astor House in large numbers, and the hundred delegates and their friends are expected at the Astor House. Accommodations have been made at the St. Nicholas Hotel for 1,200 persons. The three thousand supporters of Governor English of Connecticut will be found at this hotel principally. At the Southern and New York Hotels preparations on a grand scale are being perfected for delegates from the border and Southern States. The Everett House is negotiating with the delegation from New England. The Pendleton men will appropriate themselves at the Fifth Avenue Hotel. Colonel Wooley, of Cincinnati, has secured rooms for the West Virginia delegation, at the Fifth Avenue Hotel. The New York State delegation, numbering sixty-five, will be located at the Astor Hotel. J. Tilden, will stop at the Fifth Avenue Hotel. Committee and caucus rooms have been engaged at the hotels named from the 1st of July until the close of the convention, which will begin its session on the 4th of July. It will cost each delegate about seven dollars a day to live in this city during the convention, including the necessary trifling expenses of the barber and toothblack fees and car fare. Manufacturing statements and political papers have appeared from all the different hosts, and the 1st of June until the 3d of June until the close of the convention. The admirals of Charles Francis Adams, from Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Vermont, will repose at the Claremont Hotel. Tammany Hall will be fully ready by the 2d of June.
