The extreme difficulty of keeping weet potatoes in good condition, es pecially in the markets and storehouses cities, exposed to constant changes of heat and moisture, is fully appreciates by housekeepers and dealers in vegetables. The wonderful productiveness of this esculent in the South, and its great value as a cheap, nutri- SHIRTS. DRAWERS. CRAVATS. nous and favorite food of all classes, has often suggested the wish that it might be more available as a food product-Dr. C. K. Marshall, in the Vicksburg lunes of Sept. 4th, 1867, asked:

"Cannot sweet potatoes, which ou soil and climate are so wonderfully adapted to produce, be cut up into lit-tle slices and so dried that they might be an article of merchandise? Fruits and vegetables have been dried and prepared for shipment, and thus become valuable crops. If sweet potatoes can be treated so as to preserve the sacha rme matter, and become an article of 100d even though not as agreeable as the undried root in its best condition they would pay as handsomely as any product of the southern soil."

This inquiry has been answered by Francis H. Smith, of Baltimore, who has dried sweet potatoes successfully in his drying tunnel, which is a chamber of lath and plaster, twenty feet with a peculiar furnace at one end, a chimney of boards at the other, capa- ing them. ble of preparing twenty-five bushels of filled peaches. Mr. S. makes the following statement of his mode of proceduse:

"They are pealed by a little machine,

and sliced three-eights of an inch thick by another, with great rapidity. When dried, they have lost two-thirds of their weight, weighing twenty pounds; are white, and so flinty that the knife makes but little impression but when cooked—steaming is the best—they resume their original appear ance, and are in every respect equal t the undried fruit in its best condition.'

TAILURE OF THE PEACH CROP. After an unusual show of blossoms arly in the spring, on apple, pear, peach and cherry trees, the fact seems now settled in this section, that there will be an unusual deficiency of fruit .-The long continuance of wet weather during the critical period of blosson tertilization, acted this season as it generally does, to obstruct the forma-tion of fruit. There is an elasticity in pollen, under a favorable condition o weather making a fertile blossom, which is greatly interfered with by a continuous wet spell, such as we have just passed through. The organs, though perfect in themselves, canno act. As this excess of wet has extend ed over a large section of country, a corresponding deficiency of fruit will doubtless be the result.

One of our subscribers in Chester town, Md., writes us, "Our peach crop is almost an entire failure this year. heard a gentleman say yesterday, annually at the counter. that a month since he would not have taken \$15,000 for his crop; but now he would take \$1,500 The failure will be felt very much, as it has for years been the means of bringing a great deal of money into this county. Cecil county is likewise a sufferer, as well as the State of Delaware .- so that your cities will not be able to enjoy peaches and cream on the same terms as hereto fore."-Practical Furmer.

CHEAP FERTILIZER.

For several years past, Mr. L. E. Metcalf, of Franklin, Mass., has used of sait, ashes and plaster, on all his farm crops, with results so entirely satisfactory, that he feels safe in re commending it to others. Without being very exact in weighing or measuring the ingredients, he intends to good article and giving good measure, mix one part of salt with two parts of Farmers and others may look for the promp gray rock plaster, and then adds about an equal bulk of wood ashes. The mass is then thoroughly mixed, and allowed to stand a few days before using. If applied alone, about 300 lbs are spread upon the land whether cultivated or in grass. If other manure is used upon the same land, the compost Blacksmith Coal constantly on hand. is worked into the manure, and both used together. On land on which plaster has no perceptible effect when applied alone, this compost proves as beneficial as on land where plaster works favorably, in consequence, as he believes, of its combination with the ashes. Mr. M. prefers this homemade compost to any of the commercial manures.—Mass. Plowman.

BAWDUST-FTS USH .-- The New England Farmer devotes considerable space to the consideration of sawdust and its uses as a fertilizer and the manner of treating it preparatory to its application to the land. As preliminary, it forms a soft and excellent bedding for stock, while it absorbes and retains the larger portion of the urine which would otherwise run to waste.-Besides, it forms a more cleanly bed for stock than most other kinds, and to farmers in the vicinity of sawmills, is easily attainable. Though slow in decomposing, its retentiveness is such fi- GROCERY & FLOUR STORE. nally to impart to the land on which it is used, increased liveliness and strength, if packed down closely and occasionally watered for some time before being applied to the land. Properly prepared before being used, it may be placed in or used as a top dressing for meadows in the spring, though it is probably more effective BLACKBERRY WINE. There is no

wine equal to blackberry wine when properly made, either in flavor or for medical purposes, and all persons who can conveniently do so, should manufacture enough for their own use every year, as it is invaluable in sickness as a tonic, and nothing is a better remedy

Measure your berries and bruise them; to every gallon adding one juart of boiling water. Let the mixure stand twenty-four hours, stirring occasionally; then strain off the liquor into a cask, to every gallon adding two pounds of sugar; cork tight, and let stand till the following Octo per, and you will have wine ready for use, without straining or boiling.
This makes a most palatable wine.—
