Turming und Sonsekeeping.

PRUNING WHEN TRANSPLANTING We consider it important to shorien back all fruit trees, shrubs and vines, when transplanting. It lessens, by reducing the number of buds, the demand for supply on the roots as soon as that laid up in the bud is exhausted, and it gives increased vitality and vigor to the remaining buds, by giving to them the supply that wou have been devoted to those removed, had they been left to remain. There practice of heading-in, because of the vigor of growth and power of producing strong new shoots being much greater in some sorts than The peach, for instance, may be cut back to within two feet of the crown leaving not a limb or twig, and yet the tree in the ensuing fail will be found, under good cultivation, to have made four or five strong shoots, each as many feet long, and with abundant lateral branches. Pursue the same course with the apple, and nine times out of ten the result will be only a few feeble shoots of six inches, with a dead tree the following spring. The pear, when worked on the quince, will bear much more severe pruning back than when on the pear stock; and further, some varieties will endure more severe pruning than other . The grape, when cut back to two or three buds, grows vigorously; but if left unpruned, it struggles a year of two, produces a few imperfect bunch-es, and is dead. These are some of the many varieties that an observing horticulturist will notice on short practice, and which will soon cause him to feel confidence in transplant ing trees at any age, provided he be allowed to prime them back according to their age and habits.—Horticulturist.

RANCID BUTTER.-To a pint of wa ter add thirty drops (about half a tea-spoonful) of liquid chloride of lime. Wash in this two and a half pounds of rancid butter. When every particle f rancid butter has come in contact with the water, let it stand an hour or two; then wash it well in pure water. The butter is then left without any oder, and has the sweetness of fresh butter. These peparations of lime have nothing injurious in them.

exchanges, the editor of which says: "We forthwith obtained some of the most rancid butter, and it was bad enough for any stomach that had more sensibility than a wagon wheel. We doctored it as per recipe, and when placed on the table along with new, good butter, very able judges could not distinguish which was the new butter. Here has fact worth a year's subscription to a paper."

THE LAST MILK FROM THE UDDER. -Dr. Aderson, "Dickerson's Practical Por Liver Complaint & Bilious Derangements Agriculture." says he has found by practical analysis, in one instance, that the last cup of milk drawn from the cow's udder contained sixteen times as much cream as the first one, The separation of cream from milk fakes place in part in the udder of the cow particularly if the cow is suffered to stand at rest for some time previous to milking. If there are people who doubt that there is a difference in richness of milk first drawn from cowsand the last drawn, their doubts will be speedily removed by milking half a dozen cows and setting the first half drawn from each cow separated from

ABOUT TOMATOES .- This healthy vegetable is now used in almost every conceivable shape as food, and for s relish, and among the last, is to stew green tomatoes. This is done by paring half a dozen and slicing them down; then add a little salt and a teaspoonful of sugar, and stew them un til they are completely cooked.
