—Mr. Charles Bressler, keeper of the first toll gate, beyond the Fort, met with a painful accident on last Thursday, about 11 A.M. He was on the level in the old barn near the gate, and a board lifting Mr. Bressler fell headlong into the points of some cultivators and other sharp implements standing below. He received a fearful wound in the head and severe bruises about his body, and had to be carried to the house, when medical aid was sent for.

—The barn of Wm. Bell, near Pleasant Gap, was destroyed by fire, on Saturday afternoon, 12, about 20 o'clock. There were about 40 bushels of grain in the barn, feed, wool, clothes, &c., in the house, all of which were burned. Mr. Bell's loss is about \$800 with no insurance. The fire was caused by Mr. Bell's little boys, who found some matches on the road as they were driving cattle to water, and returning to the barn, the boys lit them, not comprehending the danger, causing the straw outside to take fire, which in an instant communicated to the barn. The dwelling house had caught some fire or six times, and it was only by the most strenuous exertions that it was saved. Mr. Bell is son of J. Bell of Aaronsburg.

—Thanks to P. S. Kerlin for papers. D. Kelly shipped two calves last week, 6 months old, that weighed together, 997 pounds.
