IMPORTANT TO VOTERS.
To secure the right to vote in Pennsylvania, all persons must be assessed two months before the election and have paid a State or county tax (either will do) within two years. In case the tax is paid this year, it must be a month before the election.

Foreign born citizens wishing to vote must take out their naturalization papers a month before the election. They must also be assessed two months previous to the day of voting and must have paid a tax as above.

The election will be held on Tuesday, the 7th day of November.
Wednesday, September 6, is the last day for being assessed.

Thursday, October 5, is the last day for securing naturalization papers.
Thursday, October 12, is the last day on which taxes can be paid in legal time to vote.

The above dates should be carefully remembered and acted on by all voters.

The democratic national conference will meet at Bellefonte, on Thursday, 12th, to day, to place in nomination a candidate for state senator. Clinton will present S. B. Peale; C. P. G.
