A statement has been prepared at the Post Office department by the commi tee appointed to conduct the official count, showing the amount of matter mai ed in the United States during the year ending December 31, 1880. This is the second count of mail matter ever made by the department, that made in 1879 being the first. The statement is base upon an actual account of matter maile at the different post offices throughout the country during the first seven days of December, 1880. It shows that the total number of pieces of all classes mailed during the year was 2,720,234,252. The whole number of letters mailed during the year was 2,053,252,876 or an average of 21 for each man, woman and child in the United States: 324,556,440 postal cards, 812,032,000 newspapers, 40,148,792 magazines and other periodicals and 21,-515,832 packages of merchandise passed through the mails during the year.

Recently Prof. W. L. Dudley announce to the Scientific Section of the Ohio Me chanics' Institute the important discov ery of the process for fusing and mould ing iridium, a metal which has hithert been considered as parctically incapable of being formed into brass. John Holland, of New York, who has long used had a broiling sun. How odd things do iridium for pointing gold pens, is the discoverer. The method consists in applying phosphorus when the ore brought to a white heat and afterwards eliminating the phosphorus by means o lime applied with great heat. The new metal has the appearance of steel, but is much harder, being next in hardness to ruby. It does not rust, and cannot be injured by acids. Professor Dudley statethat a bar of it had been used with grati fying success, in place of the negative carbon, in the electric light. It burns for sixty hours without any loss of weight, or any perceptable change in form. Iridium cannot be fashioned by hammer ing while hot nor can it be filed. It is moulded into convenient forms and then sawed or ground by rapidly revolving copper disks, treated with emery and water. Great interest has been aroused by this highly practical discovery, and already many uses for the metal have been suggested. 
