Detroit, December 15.—A daring, but probably unsuccessful, attempt was made last night by a gang of seven burglars to crack the safe of the First National Bank of St. Clair. The combination knob on the safe was knocked off with a sledge hammer and holes drilled through the lock and charged with powder, which was exploded, with what effect remains yet to be known, as the door has not yet been opened. Before commencing the work on the safe they assaulted Night Policeman Lanson, thinking that he had the keys to the street door. After knocking him down and cuffing him until nearly lifeless, they hastened, grizzled and carried him to a secluded part of the city, where they endeavored by threats of killing, to make him produce the keys. Finding he did not have them they carried him to the bank, into which one of the gang effected an entrance by climbing upon a veranda in the rear and smashing a window, through which he crawled and opened the door, admitting his pals. All wore masks, and the work proves that they are experienced cracksmen.
