DEATH OF JUDGE RUNKLE.
We are pained to inform the readers of the Reporter of the death of John K. Runkle, of Potter township, one of the Associate Judges of this county, which occurred early on Tuesday morning, last, at his home. His death was sudden and unexpected, and was caused by rheumatism of the heart an attack of which came upon him only the previous evening.
Judge Runkle was widely known and one of the most respected citizens in Pennsylvania. He was kind hearted and upright, and a friend of the poor. He was an old resident of this section, and his sudden death will be mourned by a large number of relatives and acquaintances. His age was about 70 years; his funeral, we are informed, will be at the Tusseyville church, on Friday morning, 18.

It seems the two got into a quarrel and Wian shot his relative who died an hour after. Wian fled and was traced to the above place, where he remained a few days, when an officer came and took him back to Ohio.
—The death of Judge Runkle causes a vacancy on the bench which will be filled by an appointment by the governor until next election.
—It is charged by the Clearfield Colonist that the colony that started for Montana, under the leadership of two men from Centre county, a few weeks ago, has been swindled in the purchase of sterile farming lands. Many of the colonists have returned home.
