We agree with the Williamsport Sun that it is about time that words of censure were uttered against those who favor an adjournment of the legislature for ten days, which makes in salaries the sum of upwards \$50,000. There was no need of adjourning at farthest more than a day, for the President of the Senate to appoint his committee, and the House machine to be adjusted for a new turn at the wheel. As the Republicans made an extra session necessary by refusing to favor a fair apportionment, that party must take the onus of this commonwealth.

Some of Robison's navy yard frauds will be put up at auction. The Navy Department will in a few days advertise for sale about twenty vessels. Some of these are iron-clads, others are wooden war vessels—many of which saw service in the War of the Rebellion. The vessels were pronounced unfit for service by the Examining Board some time ago and ordered to be sold. They will probably bring about as many dollars as they have cost thousands, if sold at all.

Among those to be sold is the single-turreted monitor, Dictator, now lying helpless and almost worthless at League Island. She was built in 1864 and has cost the Government \$1,500,000. Her timbers are rotten, her machinery is worthless and without nearly \$1,000,000 is spent on her she would not be fit for war duty and even then she would only be a third rate vessel.

The Susquehanna is another that will be sold. She cost one million, and is rotten. It would cost \$500,000 to make her fit for anything. The Frolic, an old blockade runner, lies at the navy yard rotten. She cost nearly \$500,000. The Florida, which cost over \$1,000,000, is pronounced rotten. Her machinery is of little value.

The Times: Stealing bills from Legislative clerks and other custodians appears to be becoming a very popular pastime. Indeed it may be said to have become a fine art. The parties who practice it have become such adepts that they get away with the bills easily enough without being caught at it. A stolen bill is responsible for the one cent toll which foot passengers have to pay across the East river bridge. A few days ago Governor Butler sent in a veto, with the information that he would have returned the bill along with the veto only someone had stolen it. It now appears that the Tewksbury appropriation bill has been stolen before the Governor had a chance to veto it. A great deal of reform is needed yet in the average Legislature if this sort of things is to continue.

"Governor Butler is making the saints dance a fine style," said a prominent lawyer who attended the Tewksbury hearing lately. The prevalent opinion is that he is making more out of the witnesses for the defense than he did out of his own. He offered to fully identify the piece of human skin taken from the body of C. J. Eklund, who died at, Tewksbury Almshouse in 1879.

He stated that Eklund can be proved by the records of the Almshouse to have been an inmate of the institution; that funeral services were held over his remains, or over a coffin said to contain them; the body was taken to Harvard Medical School for dissection; that this piece of skin, on which is tattooed in India ink a representation of the Crucifixion, with the man's name and date of birth, was removed and preserved by a man whom he can produce on the witness stand and that the management of this institution is responsible for this horrible desecration of the dead. The defense resorted to dilatory measures to prevent the testimony going in, but the Governor will persist in showing the facts.

For some years past two ladies have been passing daily through Ninth street to Prospect Park, Brooklyn, with an evidently aged but still noble-looking Newfoundland dog. He usually walks slowly and painfully between them. They often stopped for the animal to rest, only moving when he evinced a desire to proceed. They were permitted to bathe him in the park lakes. A few months ago he died; a costly coffin was made for him, and he was buried in the family lot in Greenwood Cemetery. Inquiry revealed that several years ago the ladies, mother and daughter, were wrecked on the Jersey coast. While being transferred with the dog from the ship to the beach the boat capsized. The dog rescued the daughter, and returning through the surf, aided the life saving crew in bringing the half-drowned mother ashore.

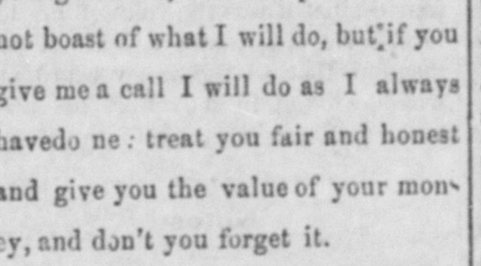
