Here comes the same old story from Chicago, on 13: This afternoon Adolph Ehrke, a bricklayer, fired two bullets into his wife's head and then blew out his own brains, dying instantly. It is thought the woman cannot recover. The deed was committed because the woman had applied for a divorce.

A clerk in a United States pension office said that it was his rule to believe every person that came in was a liar. "Hard?" he exclaimed. "You wouldn't think so if you had our experience. Perjury is nothing to what people will do to get pensions that don't belong to them. You wouldn't suppose that a great many women, for the sake of \$3 a month, would turn their marriage into adultery—illegalize their marital relations and their children. Well, I'd be willing to bet that there are 10,000 such cases. It happens in this way: A pension to a soldier's widow ceases whenever she remarries. But of course the law takes no notice of any irregular relations which she may enter into. So, if she is willing to do without any ceremony, and thus really fail to become the lawful wife of her new consort, she can continue to draw her pension money. Periodically she must come to this or some other pension office and make oath that she is not a wife. I have frequently known them to bring along their children when they make this shameful avowal. Astonishing, isn't it?"

AN IMPORTANT BILL.

An important bill for safety in case of fire of persons employed in factories and other buildings needing fire escapes has been signed by the governor, it having passed both branches of the legislature. The bill prescribes that all buildings needing fire escapes shall, in addition, have securely fastened to six window heads chains ten feet long, to which shall be attached thick ropes of sufficient length to reach to the ground. The ropes are to be placed on the window sills, and must be accessible to anybody in the building. Hotels must provide every room above the second story with such chains and ropes. Failure to comply with these regulations renders the offender liable to a fine of \$300, and to damages arising from loss of life or limb in case of fire. The third section of the act prescribes that "tenants or lessees of any building used for the purpose of manufacturing, hotel, boarding house, seminary or other building which is required by law to have fire escapes attached, and to which such fire escapes have not been erected, after giving the landlord or his agent thirty days notice to erect suitable fire escapes, and on his refusal or neglect to erect the same within the time specified in said notice, may erect and maintain suitable and legal fire escapes, and collect the cost of erection and maintenance from the landlord or his agent in an action the same as for debt, or may set off the cost thereof against rent then due or thereafter coming due."

DORSEY EXPLAINS.

Ex Senator Dorsey's letter in regard to the records of the Republican National Committee is looked upon as the beginning of an active warfare on his party against the members of that organization who "had not the courage or manhood to resent the miserable cowardice of an ambitious hypocrite."

Mr. Dorsey was asked the other evening who he meant by "ambitious hypocrite." "I meant Senator Logan," was the reply, "and I can prove the assertion. Let me tell you a significant circumstance, which is directly in the line of corroboration of what I have said. Last January the National Republican Committee met at the Arlington Hotel in this city. Before it adjourned Logan had a resolution passed thanking Charles A. Hooker, Assistant Secretary, and Sergeant-at-arms of the House of Representatives of the Forty-seventh Congress, for his services during the campaign of 1880. My name was not included in the resolution. I did not care much for that fact, but it was a deliberate insult to me. Hooker did the work during the campaign, while every politician of note, including Garfield and Arthur, had personally thanked me for valuable services rendered the party. In view of the fact that I was charged with all the dirty and mean work in Indiana, perhaps I was entitled to some little recognition at that time. Logan acted in this manner from purely selfish motives. There was an understanding between Logan and Hooker. The latter was to give Logan the Vermont delegation in the next National Republican Convention, Logan was to give Hooker his support for Sergeant-at-arms of the Senate to succeed Colonel Dick Bright. I do not think Hooker can deliver the vote of the Vermont delegation to Logan. A more treacherous man and bigger demagogue does not exist than the senior Senator from Illinois. If he should get the Presidential nomination next year I will give him one of the worst rackets that ever a politician got in this country. He would not be able to stand one moment before my batteries. Every thing I say I will prove. The country does not know Logan in his proper light. It will know him when I get after him. This is all I care to say."
