THIRTY-FIVE MINERS LOSE THEIR LIVES IN SICILY.

Hundreds of Persons Injured by Earthquake Shocks.

London, July 29 .- An explosion has ccurred in a mine at Caltivisetta, Sicily, by which thirty-five miners out of a to tal of seventy lost their lives. The town of Casamicciola, near Naples

The town of Casamicciola, near Naples was simost entirely destroyed by an earthquake last night. Neighboring towns of Fario and Lacceamero were greatly damaged. One hundred persons more or less severely injured have arrived at Naples by steamers. The shocks began at 9:30 a'clock last evening. At that hour a majority of the people of the upper classes were at the theatre. Nearly all the houses in town collapsed. It is estimated that one thousand persons estimated that one thousand persons were killed and eight hundred injured. A number of steamers have been brought into service to carry the injured to Naples. The impression produced by the disaster is indescribable. Many of the victims belong to good families.

FRENCH TROOPS ATTACK THE ANNAMITES AND KILL A THOU-SAND MEN.

Paris, July 28, 1883.—A despatch was received at the Ministry of Marine to-day announcing that the French troops had made a sortie from Hanoi, inflicting a severe loss on the enemy. The despatch says:—"Colonel Badens made a sortie on the 19th from Hanoi with a force of 500 men. He captured seven pieces of artillery and killed 1,000 of the enemy. The loss of the French in the movement was but eleven men."
