While the President and party were at Fort Washakie, W. T., the Shoshone and Arapahoe chiefs, together with five hundred warriors, called upon President Arthur, when addresses were delivered on both sides. A war dance was also given for the entertainment of the party.

Running Bird, a Cherokee Indian, was hanged at Talequah, Indian Territory, for the murder of Running Water, another Indian, in Delaware District, on Aug. 20, 1882.

Running Bird was intelligent and courageous, but in a moment of intense passion, having been goaded to desperation by the taunts of Running Water, he slew him. Bushyhead, the chief of the Cherokee Nation, was appealed to for clemency, but refused to grant it on the ground that a bitter feeling had long existed between the two men, and a fatal result had long been anticipated.

NARROW ESCAPE OF JUDGE MAYER.

The Lock Haven Journal says that Judge Mayer met with an accident about eleven o'clock Tuesday morning which might have been fatal. He got into his buggy which stood at the bar, to take a ride. Before he could get the lines, the horse started to run up the carriage drive to the double gate leading to Water street. The Judge supposed that as a matter of course the horse would stop at this gate, but such was not the case. He forced it open and made a short turn down street. The buggy up turned, but the occupant kept cool, and by careful management got out before being dragged a great distance. He received a cut on the top of his head, one on the bridge of his nose, one arm is bruised and scratched, one leg is likewise injured. On the whole, it may be put down as a fortunate escape, and in a few days the Judge will be around again.

THE CHOLERA PLAGUE.

London, Aug. 12.—The deaths from cholera in the Egyptian provinces on Friday numbered 325, including 235 in the province of Daclich, 150 in the province Garlich, and 235 in Ghirch and Atfe. On Saturday there were 789 deaths, including 30 in Cairo, 131 in Ghirch and Atfe, and 295 in the province of Sioat.

AWFUL SCENES IN ISCHIA.

The state of affairs at Ischia is worse now than ever. At first it was decided to cover the whole scene of the earthquake with chloride of lime to protect the living in their necessary work among the ruins, so great and deadly has become the stench arising from the bodies of the more than eight thousand human beings which have perished. But when it was found that scores of living persons were entombed in the ruins, the plan of wholesale disinfection had to be abandoned. To-day a man was rescued alive from the ruins. The effluvia that followed from the crevice which his person had acted upon as a tight-fitting cork overpowered his rescuers, all of whom fainted. There can be no doubt that many persons still remain alive in the Ischia ruins. It is probable that all those remaining alive to-morrow will have to be abandoned to their fate, as every part of the ruins has ceased to be endurable. Scarcely a rescuer is left to resist the terrible vomitings compelled by the indescribable stenches now prevalent. The entire island has been almost constantly shaken by a series of intermittent shocks ever since the great disaster of last Sunday. Strange to say, the odors which will now render further rescues impossible, and drive the force of humanitarians from this once beautiful island, will probably be in the hands of Italian brigands who now hover about in sufficient number to pass any probable guard, waiting their chances to rush on the scene for any plunder.

John Simmons, a merchant of Deep Creek, Va., near Norfolk, shot and killed his wife and himself Saturday. No cause for the act is assigned.

NOAH'S ARK DISCOVERED.

Finding of the Ancient Vessel in a Glacier on Mount Ararat.

A Constantinople contemporary announces the discovery of Noah's Ark. It appears that some Turkish Commissioners appointed to investigate the question of avalanches on Mount Ararat suddenly came upon a gigantic structure of very dark wood protruding from a glacier. They made inquiries of the inhabitants. These had seen it for six years, but had been afraid to approach it because a spirit of fierce aspect had been seen looking out of the upper window. Turkish Commissioners, however, are bold men, not deterred by such trifles, and they determined to reach it. Situated as it was among the fastnesses of one of the glens of Mount Ararat, it was a work of enormous difficulty, and it was only after incredible hardships that they succeeded it. The ark, one will be glad to hear, was in good state of preservation, although the ark—obscure, not the bow or stern—had been a good deal broken in its descent. They recognized it at once. There was an Englishman among them who had presumably read his Bible, and he saw it was made of the ancient gopher wood of Scripture, which, as every one knows, only grows on the plains of the Euphrates. Effecting an entrance into the structure, which was painted brown, they found that the Admiralty requirements for the conveyance of horses had been carried out, and the interior was divided into partitions fifteen feet high. Into three of these only could they get, the others being full of ice, and how far the ark extended into the glacier they could not tell. If, however, on being uncovered it turns out to be 300 cubits long it will go hard with disbelievers in the book of Genesis. "Needless to say," says the Fall Mail Gazette, "an American was soon on the spot, and negotiations have been entered into with the local Pacha for its speedy transfer to the United States."

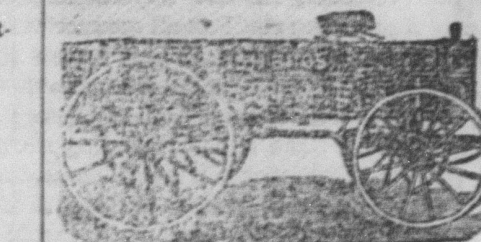
