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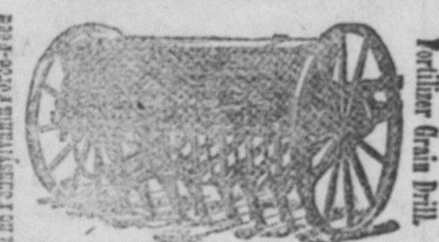

### ANIMALS AS DOCTORS.

M. G. Delaunay, in a recent communication to the Biological Society, observed that medicine, as practiced by animals, is thoroughly empirical, but that the same may be said of that practiced by inferior human races, or in other words, by the majority of the human species. Animals instinctively choose such food as is best suited to them. M. Delaunay maintains that the human race also shows this instinct and blames medical men for not paying sufficient respect to the likes and dislikes of the patients, which he believes to be a guide that may be depended on. Women are more often hungry than men, and they do not like the same kinds of food; nevertheless, in asylum for aged poor men and women are put on precisely the same regimen. Infants scarcely weaned are given a diet suitable to adults—meat and wine, which they dislike, and which disagree with them. M. Delaunay investigated this question in the different asylums of Paris, and ascertained that children do not like meat before they are about five years of age. People who like salt, vinegar, etc., ought to be allowed to satisfy their tastes. Lorraine always taught that with regard to food people's likings are the best guide. A large number of animals wash themselves and bathe, as elephants, stags, birds, and ants. M. Delaunay lays down as a general rule that there is not any species of animal which voluntarily runs the risk of inhaling emanations arising from their own excrement. If we turn our attention to the question of reproduction, we shall see that all mammals suckle their young, keep them clean, warm them at the proper time, and educate them; but these maternal instincts are frequently rudimentary in women of civilized nations. In fact, man may take a lesson in hygiene from the lower animals. Animals get rid of their parasites by using dust, mud, clay, etc. Those suffering from fever restrict their diet, keep quiet, seek darkness and airy places, drink water and sometimes even plunge into it. When a dog has lost its appetite, it eats that species of grass known as dog's grass (*Cynodon*), which acts as an emetic and purgative. Cats also eat grass. Sheep and cows, when ill, seek certain herbs. When dogs are constipated they eat fatty substances, such as oil and butter, with avidity, until they are purged. The same thing is observed in horses. An animal suffering from chronic rheumatism always keeps, as far as possible, in the sun. The warrior ant has regularly organized ambulances. Latreille told the antenae of an ant, and other ants came and covered the wounded part with a transparent fluid secreted from their mouths. If a chimpanzee be wounded, it stops the bleeding by placing its hand on the wound or dressing it with leaves and grass. When an animal has a wounded leg or arm hanging on, it completes the amputation by means of its teeth. A dog on being stung in the muzzle by a viper was observed to plunge its head repeatedly for several days into running water. This animal eventually recovered. A sporting dog was run over by a carriage. During three weeks in winter it remained lying in a brook, where its food was taken to it; the animal recovered. A terrier dog hurt its right eye; it remained lying under a counter, avoiding light and heat, although habitually it kept close to the fire. It adopted a general treatment, rest and abstinence from food. The local treatment consisted in licking the upper surface of the paw, which it applied to the wounded eye, again licking the paw when it became dry. Cats also, when hurt, treat themselves by this simple method of continuous irrigation. M. Delaunay cites the case of a cat which remained for some time lying on the bank of a river; also that of another cat which had the singular fortitude to remain for forty-eight hours under a jet of cold water. Animals suffering from rheumatic fever treat themselves by the continued application of cold water, which M. Delaunay considers to be more certain than any of the other methods. In view of these interesting facts, we are, he thinks, forced to admit that hygiene and therapeutics, as practiced by animals, may, in the interests of psychology, be studied with advantage. He could go even further and say that veterinary medicine and, perhaps human medicine, could gather from them some useful indications, precisely because they are prompted by instincts which are efficacious in the preservation or the restoration of health.—*British Medical Journal*.

Minneapolis, Minn., Aug. 12.—A. McGinnis, an explorer, who has just returned from Itaska county, reports that small pox is making terrible work among the Indians in that country. He relates fearful stories of sufferings and privations. They are entirely without medical aid and the disease has full swing. In two small towns eighty-five deaths are reported.

### DESTRUCTIVE HAILSTORM.

Des Moines, Ia., August 9.—A terrible hailstorm passed down the Nashua Valley on Tuesday night, resulting in great destruction to the growing crops and farm property. Near Odebolt Mrs. Larson was killed and other persons were wounded. Hail fell to the depth of five feet in places. Trains on the branch of the Rock Island road and the main line of the Chicago and Milwaukee road were blocked. The path of the storm was four miles wide. Everything was literally destroyed. The loss will probably exceed \$500,000.

Dubuque, August 9.—A severe storm prevailed in Shelby, Cass and Putnam counties, Iowa, last night. The growing crops were leveled to the ground. Near Brayton twenty-two head of cattle were killed by being stampeded and running down an embankment. At Horah nine freight cars were blown from the track.

Mrs. Ann Roan, a niece of Benedict Arnold, and now a decrepit old woman of between eighty and ninety, is living in Lock Haven, Pa., in a part of the town known as "The Devil's Half Acre." She has a romantic history. Her paternal grandfather was a French nobleman, who was given the city of Florence for his coat of arms; her father, Major De Hens, was a daring soldier of the Revolution, and she was otherwise widely connected with distinguished people in Europe and America. She is now an object of charity, and is described as a peaceful, gossip old woman, with much pride in her ancestry.

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Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 12.—A heavy thunder storm prevailed here yesterday. Three boys named Robert Miller and William Miller, brothers, and Ernest Smith, who had taken refuge under a tree, were struck and instantly killed by lightning.
