WORK OF A CYCLONE. It causes Death and Destruction in the West.

Minneappolis, Minn., August 22 -A neavy storm raged west and south of here yesterday. The report comes from Casson, on the Winona and St. Peter ailroad, that the cyclone passed over that pace, blowing down many buildings, killing two persons and injuring several others. Hail stones that fell measured

ten inches in circumference. Governor Hubbard has received word from Rochester stating that the town is in ruins and that forty persons have details of the ravages of the storm, as Owattana state that twenty-five persons the Rochester and Northern railroad. It is believed from the reports that have come in that the whole country surrounding Rochester is in ruins. killed may reach up into hundreds. The train that was wrecked was that which leaves Rochester at about 4 o'clock p. m., arriving at Brambata at 5 o'clock. It was caught in a severe wind and hail storm that prevailed in that vicinity between five and six o'clock, and while running at a high rate of speed was lifted from the rails and converted into a mass of ruins. Gentlemen who have been to the scene of the disaster de scribe it as one of the most horrifying railroad accidents ever witnessed. Evry car in the train was a complete wreck and was literally shattered to pieces by the sudden stop caused by the train's leaving the rail, burying the unfortunate passengers beneath the debris, killing many and injuring nearly every person on the train.

The storm appeared to have formed about eighteen miles northwest of Rochester, and gathering violence as it progressed, destroying several farm houses in its course. A lowering, dim colored, funnel-shaped cloud was seen approaching the fated town, and in a few moments the slaughter had been accomplished. No time was given for any preparations had it been possible. The scene among the devastated districts and the place where the dead lay was indescribably sad. Mothers wildly searched for their children, while little homeless waifs or of a family of seven. The passengers of the train on which was Mr. Peck, were not aware that a cyclone had passed near them until their attention was directed to feather beds and articles of clothing lodged against the barbed wire fences which indicated something of a blow. Wheat and large quantities of straw were twisted about the rails, presenting a singwrecked on a trestle at the western approach of the place. The wind twisted the switch bar from its place, throwing saving his life. The fireman was carried over the embankment with the engine and killed. The path of the storm through Rochester was strewn with wrecks, in the poorer portions of the suourbs on the north side. Vienne, August 24 .- A dispatch from Frohsdorf states that Count de Chambord died at 7 o'clock this morning. Count de Chambord was the last of the anceint line of the kings of France, and would, had he assumed the throne, reigned under the title of Henri V. His sickness has all along caused much specula tion and not a little disturbance in the governmental matters in France. In May it was thought that he would make been killed.
