CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—To-day the general time convention of railroad men has been held at the Grand Pacific hotel. To this meeting there attaches immeasurably greater importance than to any that has yet been held, because of a proposition to entirely revolutionize the railway time system of the country. At present it is estimated that fully fifty different standards of time are in use on the different railroads, and it is proposed to reduce this annoying complication to a system in which there will be but five divisions. The proposed innovation had its inception in the April meeting, and it has since been submitted to all the railroad companies in the country. In these, managers of sixty thousand miles of track, have voted in favor of its adoption, and there are, practically, no negative votes. But one road has shown any opposition to it, and that is an insignificant line in Canada. The following companies have not yet recorded their votes: Chicago, Burlington and Quincy; Delaware, Lackawanna and Western; Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul; Chicago, and Northwestern; Kansas City, St. Joseph and Council Bluffs; Illinois Central; Richmond and Danville; making about fifteen hundred miles of track. High officials of nearly all of these lines, however, have spoken in favor of the new proposition, so that there is no doubt of its adoption. The proposition is to divide the whole country into five divisions—the inter-colonial, 60 deg. west from Greenwich; the Eastern, 75 deg. west from Greenwich; the Central, 90 deg. west from Greenwich; the Mountain, 105 deg. west from Greenwich; the Pacific, 120 deg. west from Greenwich. The divisions are 15 deg. apart, which is equivalent to one hour of time. Another matter of considerable importance is the proposition to divide the clock dials into 24 instead of 12 hours, which will be discussed by the Convention. By this arrangement 1 P. M. would be 12 o'clock and 12 o'clock P. M. would be 24 o'clock. The supporters of the system argue that the present arrangement of designating the first 12 hours of the day as ante-meridian and the last 12 hours as post-meridian leads to too much confusion, and under the new system no mistakes can be made between the A. M. and P. M. While all concede the superiority of the proposed plan over the one in use, yet it is feared that to introduce it all at once would result in many mistakes, and possibly many accidents. The objects, however, express a willingness to submit the proposition to a thorough discussion.

Testimony of a \$100,000 Will.
JAMAICA, L. I., Oct. 9.—The hearing in the contest to set aside the will of Mrs. Margaret Eliza Johnson, of Hempstead, who died in January last, leaving an estate worth \$100,000, was continued to-day before Surrogate Towand, of Queens county, at his office here. Mrs. Mary B. Becar, a daughter of the testatrix, asks to have the will set aside on the ground of undue influence. Mrs. Johnson bequeathed her property, with the exception of \$5,000, to her son Samuel, who resides at Stratford, Conn. Thirty-three witnesses have been examined and twelve sittings held. Six witnesses for the contestants were heard to-day. The hearing will be continued next Tuesday.

An American Consul's Assassination.
PARIS, Oct. 8.—A dispatch has been received here from Canton stating that the American Consul (Charles Seymour, of Wisconsin) has been assassinated. Up to 3 o'clock this morning, however, no official confirmation has reached diplomatic circles, though the report is generally credited.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 8.—Up to a late hour First Assistant Secretary of State Davis had received no information either confirming or contradicting the reported assassination of Consul Seymour at Canton, China. He has sent a cable dispatch making inquiry about the truth of the report.

A Part-Colored Wedding.
FLORHAM, N. Y., Oct. 10.—There is considerable talk here over the alleged marriage of Miss Eliza Hinckman, colored, aged nineteen years, to Joseph Miller, a thrifty German farmer. The ceremony is said to have been performed by Rev. C. C. Leasby, the white pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church. The happy couple, so rumor has it, have departed for Cincinnati, their future home.

An American Crow Rescued.
LONDON, Oct. 8.—Dispatches received here from Breton, West Australia, report the arrival there of the British steamer Linorea, having on board the crew of the American schooner C. W. Lewis, of Thomaston, Maine. The schooner was abandoned at sea in a sinking condition, her crew taking to the boat. They had endured great suffering and were nearly exhausted when picked up by the Linorea.

A Fatal Railroad Accident.
WADSWORTH, O., Oct. 11.—The Northern ground passenger train on the Dayton and Michigan Road last night ran into a freight train just south of this town. The passenger train was thrown over and completely demolished. The fireman, William Luman, was severely injured, but Engineer Curtis escaped unhurt. None of the passengers were injured.

Work on the Cape Cod Canal.
SANDWICH, Mass., Oct. 11.—Three dredges and pile drivers, with a large number of workmen have arrived here. Work will be at once commenced upon the Cape Cod Ship Canal. E. A. Lockwood and O. W. McCall, of Boston, arrived to-day, to prepare for the work. Within three weeks 500 men will be laboring upon the line of the canal.

He Should Be Hanged.
PROVIDENCE, R. I., Oct. 11.—Abraham Minard, a French boatman, has been held in \$1,000 for trial on a charge of strangling Mary J. Thompson, fourteen years old. He had taken her from an orphan asylum and placed her into his family. She is in charge of the Overseer of the Poor, in a serious condition.

Gay De Lesseps.
PARIS, Oct. 11.—M. De Lesseps gave a grand fete at his country residence. The rustic population of the vicinity were generally invited, and the venerable projector of canals outdressed the liveliest and most vigorous of the village girls.

Road Agents Rob a Stage.
PRESCOTT, Oct. 11.—Highway men stopped the Wickenburg stage last night, three miles from here, robbed the passengers and carried off Wells & Fargo's express box and mail. The sheriff's posse with an Indian guide have started in pursuit.

Forty Persons Drowned.
MADRID, Oct. 13.—There has been a succession of heavy rains in the Province of Ferrol for the past few days, causing a flood by which forty persons are known to be drowned and sixteen houses totally destroyed. Much damage to crops has been done and considerable distress prevails in the district.

National League Funds.
DUBLIN, Oct. 11.—A large National League meeting was held here last night at which the receipt of £1,000 from America and the same amount from Australia was acknowledged.
