A Besperate Fight with Counter-

& feiters. INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 2.- The authorities here have just received a telegram announc-ing that a force of detectives and deputy United States marshals had a desperate fight at a small station called Blind Tiger, twentylive miles from Evansville, with a large gang of counterfeiters. The officers were headed by Gen. R. S. Foster, United States marshal, and E. A. Abbott of the secret service, and numbered fourteen in all. The counterfeiters were led by Joe and Jesse Helcheno, the former of whom was shot through the lung and the latter through the right thigh. Of the officers Jack Killean, detective, was shot brough the hand and Andy Hart, a deputy, narrowly, escaped death. Nine of the coun-erfeiters were captured. The gang is one of he most skillful, and dangerous ever capured, and has been operating largely in three states, manufacturing thousands of dollars and smaller coin. The detectives have been ifter them nine months.

The Third Auditor's Work.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 .- Secretary Folger has received the report of the third auditor of the treasury department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883. The number of accounts settled during the year was 16,664, involving \$70,508,298; and the number of accounts unsettled June 30, 1883, was 25,891, involving \$92,055,111. The number of requiations drawn by the secretaries of war and nterior was 9,098, amounting to \$107,003,080; ension agents accounts, numbering 607, were received amounting to \$105,510,021, and 82 accounts, involving \$41,570,870, were resorted to the second comptroller of the reasury for final action. Attention is called to the increase of work in the pension office, 38,000 pensioners having been added to the oll during the fiscal year. A statue of imitations is also urged, fixing some period within which claimants must present their demands or be forever barred.
