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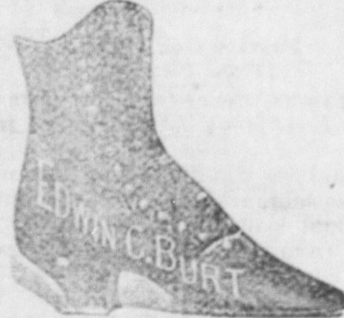

## A HUSBAND'S SEX IN DISPUTE.

The Matrimonial Mixture and Mystery in Waupun, Wisconsin.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 1.—The developments in the Waupun matrimonial mixture continue to be the one topic of conversation, but they show no motive for Mrs. Hudson's eccentric escapade, unless her object was to hide her identity. It seems improbable that the girl, Gertrude Fuller, could have been ignorant of the facts; but that these two women were actually married by a regularly ordained minister of the Gospel under the roof of the bride's mother and in the presence of the family and friends, and that for a period of eight months they had lived together as man and wife, have appeared in public, and made many acquaintances, with no breath of suspicion as to the real condition of things, stand as facts.

Frank Dubois (Mrs. Hudson) and his (her) wife and sister have gone to Brandon. The impression that is fast gaining ground among people refusing to believe that the young wife could have been deceived as to the sex of her husband is that she at least was in the secret, although perhaps the stepmother, Mrs. Hewitt, who has repeatedly declared that Dubois is a man, may have been deceived. The theory that Gertrude Fuller consented to live with Mrs. Hudson as Frank Dubois, in order to shield her from suspicion regarding her sex, is the only one compatible with the fact that Dubois and Hudson's wife are one and the same person, if it be a fact, and few here doubt it. The marriage is the only thing that has prevented the truth coming to light before, as Dubois, although doing work of all kinds, had a short, stout, womanish figure, and a walk hardly to be called manly. He smoked, chewed, and swore like a trooper. The couple are supposed to be in Brandon at present, she wife and her sister having left here to join the husband there, with the avowed intention of bringing him home to prove his sex.

Hudson first obtained a clue to his wife's whereabouts through an anonymous letter thought to have been written by a former Fond du Lac woman, now residing here. Gertrude claims that Hudson is a shiftless, good-for-nothing, whom Dubois had helped in times gone by, and that rather than the man and his children quartered on him for the winter he skipped out. While in Fond du Lac Mrs. Hudson, who helped support the family, was known to have hired livery rigs and driven off attired in men's clothes, presumably to prosecute her courtship of the unsophisticated Waupun girl. It is reported, too, that the strangely mated couple were traced to Brandon, where they spent one day and then departed for a more congenial climate. The latest gossip from Waupun is that Hudson will swear out a warrant for the arrest of his wife.

## BUTLER AND TILDEN.

The Governor's Reference to the Sage of Greystone.

BOSTON, Oct. 29.—The peculiar reference to Tilden in Gov. Butler's speech at Spencer has caused much comment. The governor said:—"There has been got up in Boston a little embryo rebellion. Colonel Codman and about twenty-five others of his party have got together and chosen committees to go to the wards and see that there are no frauds—I believe twenty-five to a ward—and then Colonel Codman says that the legislature will be called upon if there is any occasion for it. That is to say, if Robinson don't get a majority they will throw out the precincts that they say are fraudulent. Well, we will see about that. (Applause.) That is to say, if the people of the commonwealth elect me, the legislature is going to throw out votes enough not to elect me—to prevent my election under the direction of Col. Codman. It is the best symptom of the campaign. Men do not get ready for revolution, when, as they say, they are sure of nearly 30,000 majority, and I am not going to get but 25,000 votes in Boston. (Laughter.) Then, why all this cry of fraud in advance? Why threaten the people if their candidate chances to be elected, that the legislature will count him out? Well, now, I want it distinctly understood my name is not Tilden. (Tremendous applause and cheers, lasting for several minutes and breaking out again and again.) I say my name is not Tilden; and if I am elected governor of Massachusetts I shall take the seat and exercise the power, Codman or no Codman. (Tremendous applause.) No, my friends, no little rebellion here. I have smelt gunpowder, and I shall not be frightened by garlic. (Great Laughter.) The people, if they elect a governor, will have one, and I advise every man to take that to his heart. (Great applause.) I make no threats; I only insist that the people shall have their rights. No more 8 to 7 business in this country, neither in the nation nor in the state. It never can come again where I have anything to do with it. (Applause.) I thought it best to say so much, lest somebody should make a mistake about it."

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—The World has this special from Boston: The political leaders in the state have been holding counsel and both parties profess to be confident of success. It is plain to all candid observers, however, that there is no real confidence on either side. The republicans are the loudest to talk about getting a large majority, but that they are really alarmed is proven by the fact that they are making a desperate effort to raise money. Butler is worn out with hard work and is losing his temper.

**A Very Valuable Head of Hair.**  
CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—Miss Helen Close began a suit here Saturday against Mrs. M. J. McGlashan, who advertises her business as that of a "scalp surgeon." The plaintiff alleges that she was in possession of a head of hair rare in color, length and thickness, and that while having it treated in Mrs. McGlashan's office it was so entangled that defendant was unable to straighten it out; that while pretending to disentangle it the doctor removed half of it with shears; that afterward she bathed it with a preparation which turned the scalp black, and that plaintiff has since been unable to disentangle the remainder, and had been compelled to cut it all close to the head. Miss Close lays her damages at \$8,000.

**Bears at a Mass Meeting.**  
BALTIMORE, Oct. 30.—A special to The Sun from Easton, Talbot county, Md., says a large Republican mass meeting was held there yesterday. All the colored people of county took a holiday and came to town. Mr. Holton, republican candidate for governor, Gen. Adam E. King and others addressed the meeting and were attentively listened to. Other speakers followed, and when the meeting was at its height a fellow with three trained bears appeared upon the scene and the negroes all left the meeting to see the bears dance and climb trees. The speaking was nearly stopped. It is charged that the democrats employed the man with the bears to break up the meeting by drawing off the colored people.

**An Eminent Man's Death.**  
COLUMBIA, S. C., Nov. 1.—Armedist Burt, one of the oldest and most learned lawyers in South Carolina, died suddenly while alone in his office at Abbeville. He was a member of Congress from 1848 to 1850 and was speaker of the house of the thirtieth congress.
