V. board in Philadelphia, on Wednesday last, a resolution was passed that the company guarantee the payment of principal and interest on bonds for the construction of the branch from Bellefonte to Lemont, and that they proceed to build same immediately upon receiving notice from the Penn'a R. R. Company that the work of extending the road from Spring Mills to Lemont has been ordered.

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ANXIOUS TO SERVE.

The Nation as Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Ben Butler Goes to Washington and Says Cox will be the Man—All Parties Very Confident—The Result Doubtful.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—Gen. Butler thinks Mr. Cox ought to be elected speaker. He visited Mr. Cox's headquarters at Willard's, and his all pervading presence made Mr. Cox's canvass seem like a very tangible thing, a feature it has not heretofore noticeably possessed; for, despite Mr. Cox's earnestness and that of Gen. Blount, Congressman Hill and two or three others, there was a feeling that there has been more of desire than of expectation in his canvass.

Mr. Carlisle thinks that Mr. Cox will get a very handsome vote on the first ballot, but that as balloting goes on Mr. Cox's friends will leave him. Mr. Carlisle expects to get a fair proportion of Mr. Cox's vote. On the other hand Mr. Randall's friends here say that the bulk of Mr. Cox's vote will go to Mr. Randall. This parcelling out of his strength by the other candidates does not please Mr. Cox, and he intimates that it will be found that there is any parcelling out of votes his will have the benefit thereof.
