HINTS FOR THE GUEST CHAMBER.—In the guest chamber always have a copy of the Bible, placed in large, clear type, also a few books or magazines. I once passed several days, the Sabbath included, with a friend. Not knowing the customs of the family, on the morning I arose early, as usual, and waited three and one-half long hours before breakfast was announced, with nothing but meditations to employ my time.

Then again, the useful guest finds it pleasant to put little finishing touches to the room, and a handbrush and duster to gather up the dust or little ends of thread—a duster so nice and clean as to require a bit of paper pinned on to designate its use—and a good-sized piece of cotton, colored or white, tucked in the handle of the sloop-jar will be readily understood and appreciated. Then, too, a corn-broom, in one of those cunning little fancy cases now in vogue, is very useful.

A square of oilcloth in front of the toilet stand may save your carpet from spots.

A spare newspaper one does not always think of bringing, to use while combing the hair. These are little things, but "mighty conveyance."

Vacate one or two drawers in the bureau for the use of your guest, and see that there are spare hosiery in the closet also—a box of hair pins—a small basket containing a few needles, spoons of cotton, threads of black and colored silk, scissors, boot and glove buttoner, and other little things of a similar character may be of timely service to the transient guest.

Sometimes a mattress, unless it be of hair, is found too hard to sleep upon, and feathers too warm. To obviate the difficulty, place the feather bed on top, and on it a new piece of wide straw matting covered with one thickness of cotton cloth, and the bed will be comfortable and cool.

A clean apron is not always put on while making up beds, and to prevent the sides of mattresses becoming solid, sew strips of cotton over them; they can be readily removed for washing, and look nicer if starched.

An Interesting Patent Suit. Nelson Lyon, of Albany, N. Y., has recovered judgment of \$447,10, against G. T. Fisher & Co., in the U. S. circuit court, at Detroit, Mich., for an infringement of Lyon's Patent Metallic Hoop Stiffener. This contrivance is one of the most useful of modern inventions, and has achieved a remarkable sale—over 750,000 worth, the testimony shows, having been sold since its invention. The invention consists of a neat metal plate fastening to the outside of a boot or shoe heel, arranged to prevent the counters from breaking over and the heel from wearing down unevenly. The attorney-general of the United States declared the Lyon patent invalid on account of an informality in the application. This was afterwards corrected by the commissioner of patents, in accordance with a special act of congress authorizing it. Action was commenced in May, 1880, a perpetual injunction was obtained in December, and the case was referred to a master, who reported the damages at \$5,500, but on motion the court doubled the same, and directed judgment to be entered against the defendants for said damages, with interest and costs.
