Conductor's rates remain at 3 cents per mile, and persons paying on trains will be charged the higher rate, except when taking passage from stations where there are no ticket offices, in which case they will pay but 3c per mile. The new rate from Spring Mills to Lewisburg will be \$1.25, old rate \$1,47-other points are in proportion. When possible, passengers should always buy their tickets before entering the cars-it will be a positive gain for them to do so.




