DENOUNCED.

The Ohio Democrats who Betrayed Pendleton.

Denouncing the Success of the Syndicate—The Columbus Times' Diastrophic Forebodings—Speculations.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—"There is a calm today," says the Columbus, O., correspondent of The Times, "and the hoodlums that have been howling for the past ten days for 'Payne and reform' have nearly all left the city."
The special committee: "The legislature, where the bulk of the 'swag' went, has resumed its duties as alleged honest men, to formulate laws for the punishment of crime. Both Mr. Pendleton and Gen. Darbin Ward left here for their respective homes tonight, the former completely worn out because of the turmoil of the past ten days. Oliver Payne, the treasurer of the Standard Oil company, and John R. McLean, with the Enquirer agitation, have also departed, but have left marks behind which will not soon be obliterated. Congressmen Lefevre and Payne are being severely handled, and the former is denounced as a traitor of the deepest dye."

There has been much speculation as to how John G. Thompson's paper would accept the result, and there is general surprise at the independence it shows in its issue of this evening. Its head lines tonight giving the report of the caucus are decidedly pertinent and read: "Thirty pieces of silver, Judas Iscariot, the arch traitor, but it cost the Standard Oil McLean faction a much larger hoodie to subvert the will of the people." "Report of the caucus which elected Henry B. Payne United States senator and sold out the democracy to the money power." Editorially, The Columbus Times says:

We are heartless, but not dependent. The task of writing is difficult. The reader is stunned by the revelation that pretrefaction could gain a spot to further rot within the democratic party. There can be no rest. The democratic press of this state, that has stood a noble phalanx against the violation of fundamental doctrine and party precedent, must know no cessation of its work. The people must rule and overthrow bossism. The monopoly of the Standard Oil company must be destroyed. Its intrusion into political circles must be prevented. There must be no later acceptance of this outrage. Party purity and perpetuity permit no complacency. These pernicious and foreign elements must be eradicated, and until they are no democrat will enter the capitol of Ohio or of the nation.

Corruption has made rotten the democratic legislature of Ohio. Money has had its potency to drag honor down into the mire. Satanic temptings by promises of future official profit have seduced the trustees of one of the noblest estates within the transfer of men. The guardians of political rights have betrayed their wards. These traitors to their constituents must be investigated. To the evidence accumulated untiringly, labor must add more damning testimony. The insult to the law of the state must be avenged, and a penitentiary door opened for any one who is proved guilty of corruption. There will be legal evidence. Skulking away and vacant stares tell now the story of bribery. The Dayton Democrat and other papers speak out in a similar strain. Ex-Senator Thurman characterizes the work of last night as monstrous and disreputable.

The Nailmakers' Strike.
MIDDLEBORO, Mass., Jan. 11.—The nailers met in convention at the Misoot house to take definite action in relation to the proposed reduction of fifteen per cent. Delegates were present representing the Wareham, Weymouth, West Wareham, Somerset and Bridgewater nailers. This includes the whole number of nail companies in Massachusetts, with one exception, the Fall River company, which has not reduced the wages of the men. The feeling was unanimously in favor of a strike against the proposed reduction. The various companies will be notified of the action of the meeting, and the men will stop work Saturday night. The preliminary steps toward the formation of the nailers' association were taken and a committee appointed to carry the action into effect. The number of nailers to strike is about 1,000.

Contagious Cattle Diseases.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—An important conference, well attended by gentlemen interested in legislation for the suppression of contagious diseases among domestic animals, has been held at the department of agriculture. Commissioner Loring, Senator Miller, of New York, chairman of the senate committee on agriculture, and others were present. There was a general interchange of views on the subject, showing a determination to push remedial legislation in Congress this winter. Mr. Hatch said that his committee was formulating a bill which would soon be reported to the house, and Senator Miller said that any measure looking to the suppression of these contagious diseases will find favor and soon pass the senate. The committee will remain here and raise their plans to congress.

Who Will be President Pro Tem?
WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Immediately after the adjournment of the senate a caucus of the republican senators was held to discuss the appointment of a president pro tem to succeed Senator Edmunds, who has indicated his desire to be relieved. The caucus did not agree upon a nomination. There was a general interchange of views in regard to the selection of Senator Anthony, which were all expressive of the most friendly feeling toward that gentleman. On account of his ill health, however, in order to ascertain his wishes, it was decided that it would be best to confer with the senator on the subject before taking action. For this purpose a committee of three was appointed, with instructions to report at a future caucus.

Senators' Pocket Expenses.
CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 11.—Curious are the needs of the United States senate, as it is shown by its receipts and expenditures, published and just issued by the public printer. To regulate this august body properly, purchases were made of 950 quarts of Appalachee and 570 quarts of Bethesda water, and, as the means of warding off the effects of such an infernal deluge, 2,100 two-grain quinine pills were bought. A 47 1/2 lb. of Copenhagen snuff appears in the account, probably for the member who has the nose of four trumpet power. For the Anglonomics two British almanacs, costing \$5, were provided. Two very mysterious items are in the list—40 cents for a half bushel of fine nit and 75 cents for a dark lantern.

The Czars' Enemies.
LONDON, Jan. 12.—The Standard's correspondent at St. Petersburg telegraphs that one Degreff and a woman in disguise, both of whom have since been arrested, were the originators and executors of the assault which resulted in the ear being wounded and thrown from the car being wounded. It is reported that the woman is a sister of Strakoff, who was hanged for complicity in the assassination of Alexander II.

How Watch Cases are Made.
In buying a silver watch case great care should be taken to secure one that is solid silver throughout. The cap of most cheap silver cases is made of a composition known as alaba, which is a very poor substitute for silver, as it turns black in a short time. The backs of such cases are made much thinner than those of an all silver case, being robbed in order to make the cap thicker and get in as much as possible of the cheap metal. Another important point in a silver case is the joints or hinges, which should be made of gold. Those of most cheap cases are made of silver, which is not a suitable metal for that purpose. In a brief period it warps, bends and spreads apart, allowing the backs to become loose upon the case and admitting the dust and dirt that accumulate in the pocket. Wanted by the Lewisburg & Tyrone Railroad Co.

All ties must be made of green or living timber, white oak, rock oak, or chestnut, free from decay, knots and other imperfections. They must be eight feet six inches long, seven inches thick and not less than seven inch face, to be hewn parallel sides, with straight faces, squared off square and stripped of the bark. They must be delivered on the line of railroad, stacked up in neat stacks of fifty each, alternate layers consisting of square and round which is as high or higher than the grade of the road, and in such position as to admit of being counted and inspected.
