

A MODERN RESURRECTION.

A Miracle that Took Place in our Midst Unknown to the Public—The Details in Full.

One of the most remarkable occurrences ever given to the public, which took place here in our midst, has just come to our knowledge and will undoubtedly awaken as much surprise and attract as great attention as it has already in newspaper circles. LADY FIGURES.—To make lady figures for afternoon tea, rub half a pound of butter into a pound of prepared flour; to this add half a pound of sugar, the juice and rind of one large lemon, and, lastly, three eggs, the whites and yolks beaten separately, and the whites stirred in after all the other ingredients are well mixed together. This dough should be thick enough to make rolls about the size of a lady's finger. It will spread when in the oven so that it will be the right size and shape. If you wish, them to be varied and anything, dip them in a chocolate icing after they are baked, and harden for a moment in the oven.

PORTWINE FRITTERS.—Take four ounces of rice, a pint of milk, two ounces of sugar, the same of butter, three eggs, a small stick of cinnamon and a half pound of orange marmalade. After washing the rice thoroughly place in a stew-pan, together with the milk, sugar, butter and cinnamon. Allow these ingredients to simmer slowly until the rice has absorbed the milk, then stir the yolks of the three eggs and the marmalade. Stir over a brisk fire for a few moments, then turn into a clean baking dish and spread out to about a quarter of an inch in thickness. When cold cut into oblong shapes, fry crisp, first dipping into batter, dust with cinnamon sugar and serve hot on a napkin. This is a very delicious dish.

There is one thing about which the young housekeeper may well listen to advice. She must make up her mind that any servants she may hire will have faults. If she calmly settles this in her mind she will be spared a great deal of trouble. Her care will be to discover what the faults are, and not if the faults exist. Some of these may be endured with fortitude, and will not cause too much mental friction; others absolutely cannot be borne. There are cases when the possession of a sense of humor will help one to bear what would otherwise be annoying.

GINGER PUDDING.—Take three eggs, three ounces of sugar, the same of butter, the same of flour, a half pint of cream, four ounces of preserved ginger and a little pinch of salt. Put the butter, sugar, cream and salt into a stew-pan, and as soon as it begins to simmer take off the fire and add the flour, stirring well; put back on the fire and stir for a few minutes, then add the eggs; mix well and add the ginger, which should be cut in small pieces; pour into a buttered mould and steam for an hour; serve hot with a sauce made with the syrup of the ginger, a little cream and a few almonds.

A nice way to fix the crust for tarts is to roll it thin, cut out with a smooth cookie cutter, then with a small cup cut out the centre of some of them; have the cup large enough so that just a ring of crust will be left; place two of these on each round of dough; if you fill with jelly, it is a pretty addition to make a meringue of the white of an egg and little sugar, and put over the top, and brown slightly in the oven. If filled with jam, put a little sugar in milk and wet the crust with it; this will make it brown delicately, and it gives an excellent flavor to the crust.

An entrée that is very enjoyable is made of fish of any kind that is fine-grained and of delicate flavor. Make patty-shells the same as if for oyster-patties; bake them and then fill them with the fish which you have picked in very small bits and have cooked tender. Make a little gravy of butter and sweet milk, with flour to thicken, and pour over the fish, though some prefer the fish without the gravy, and put a little butter, pepper and salt over the top.

STUFFING.—To make a good stuffing for turkeys or other fowls and veal, chop finely one-quarter of a pound of suet, mix with it twice the quantity of breadcrumbs, a large spoonful of parsley, a teaspoonful of thyme and marjoram mixed, one-eighth of a nutmeg, some grated lemon-peel, salt and pepper, and bind the whole with two eggs. A teaspoonful of finely shred shallot or onion may be added at pleasure.

PUDDING made of cracked wheat is very agreeable and nourishing. To one quart of sweet milk allow nearly half a cupful of cracked wheat; put it in a pudding dish and bake slowly for two hours, stirring it several times. If you choose to do so you can add raisins and a little cinnamon for flavoring, but most people prefer it well salted, and to eat it with a little cream and sugar. This is nice both warm and cold.

EGGS WITH NUT-BROWN BUTTER.—Put four ounces of butter in an omelet pan on the fire, and as soon as it begins to fritter break the eggs into it without disturbing the yolks; season with pepper and salt and fry for five minutes, then place on a hot dish; add two more ounces of butter to the pan and fry a brown color; add two tablespoonfuls of French vinegar, boil for two minutes, pour over the eggs and serve.

GRUEL SAUCE.—Make rather thick with a paste of butter and flour, some strong beef gravy, and season it lightly with lemon juice, ketchup, cayenne, and a teaspoonful each of made mahar, essence of anchovies, mince-onion and grated yellow rind of lemon. This is appropriate to deviled fowls, pour over the eggs and serve.

WILD DUCKS.—After they are cleaned and ready for cooking, wrap them in a clean cloth and bury for twelve hours in the earth to remove the strong flavor of these birds. They are usually cooked without stuffing. Three-quarters of an hour will be sufficient to cook them.
