**THE NATIONAL CAPITAL**

A Review of Current Events at the Seat of Government.

**Action of Committees on Important Measures—What Congress Intends to Do—And What Some Congressmen Find to Say.**

**Minister Sargent's Position.**

WASHINGTON, March 23.—Secretary Frerkinghousen has received no communication from Minister Sargent indicating a desire to remain at Berlin and not accept the St. Petersburg mission. It is stated at the department that the duties of minister at Berlin will devolve upon Mr. Sidney Everett, of the United States legation at that city, and that the post at Berlin will remain unfilled for some time. It is stoutly denied on all sides that Secretary Folger's name has been considered in connection with the Berlin mission.

**A Place for Tom Ochiltree.**

WASHINGTON, March 27.—President Arthur, late yesterday afternoon, sent to the senate a communication nominating Mr. Sargent, now minister at Berlin, to be minister at St. Petersburg, vice Hunt deceased. Soon after the receipt of this communication, the senate went into executive session and unanimously confirmed the nomination.

**Information Wanted.**

WASHINGTON, March 25.—In the senate Mr. Van Wyck offered the following preamble and resolution, which, on objection of Mr. Ingalls, lies over one day:

Whereas, On the 24th day of January, 1884, the senate adopted the following:

Resolved, That the attorney general be directed to inform the senate when and by whom compensation for special attorneys in the Star route case in the District of Columbia was fixed, and to furnish copies of any agreements or memoranda relating thereto, and if, in his judgment, the compensation is unreasonable, why he ratified and continued the same. Also, whether said attorneys or any of them are now in the employ of the department of justice, and at what compensation.

**To Fix a Salary Schedule.**

WASHINGTON, March 26.—The Springer committee this morning appointed a sub-committee, composed of Messrs. Springer, Van Alstyne, Stevenson, Bowen and Hemphill, to devise a scheme of salaries to be paid United States marshals, district attorneys, clerks of supreme courts and their deputies, in lieu of fees, as now. The sub-committee will report to the full committee in a few days, and it is the intention to attach the scheme to the sundry civil service appropriation bill, so that it may go through at an early day. The sub-committee has not yet formulated anything as to the amount of salaries these officers shall be paid, but \$3,000 for marshals and \$3,500 for district attorneys and about half those amounts for deputies are mentioned.

**Gresham and a Judgeship.**

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Senator Harrison, at the request of an Indiana official, signed a petition to the president for the appointment of Postmaster Gresham to be Judge Drummond's successor. The senator explains that he did so on the assurance that Gen. Gresham desired the office, and that the petition was being circulated with his knowledge. Indiana explains their activity in regard to Gresham in this matter by saying that reasons personal to himself impel him to this course, and that any denial or seeming denial in any quarter is only diplomatic, and intended to serve the object which the petition bears and Gen. Gresham have in view.

**For the Greely Relief Expedition.**

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Capt. Schley will be ordered to the Thetis, the flagship of the Greely relief expedition, on April 2, and after that date will make his headquarters at the Brooklyn navy yard, to perfect the arrangements for the expedition. He speaks of the Thetis as the finest Arctic vessel he has ever seen.

**England's Arab Allies.**

SEATTLE, March 22.—Gen. Graham and Admiral Hewitt have had a durbar with a large number of Sheiks, who agree to protect the road to Berber, and to maintain peace. The Sheiks assert that Osman Digma intends to attack any caravans that are sent out.

**The Week's Failure.**

NEW YORK, March 23.—There were 162 failures in the United States reported to Bradstreet's during the past week against 192 in the preceding week, and 170, 139 and 97 in the corresponding weeks of 1883, 1882 and 1881 respectively.

**Heavy Failure.**

NEW YORK, March 23.—Dispatches from Boston report the failure of Wetherill Bros., steel commission merchants. They were the agents in the United States of Wilson Hawkesworth, Ellison & Co., of Sheffield, England, and were supposed to be worth \$150,000.

**For Mayor of Jersey City.**

JERSEY CITY, March 23.—At the Republican city convention the delegates unanimously selected as their candidate for mayor Gilbert Collins, the gentleman nominated on Monday night by the Citizens' association.

**PRINCE LEOPOLD DEAD.**

**Queen Victoria's Youngest Son Dies Suddenly at Cannes.**

LONDON, March 28.—Considerable gloom was cast over the city by the receipt of telegraphic messages from Cannes stating that the Duke of Albany (Prince Leopold) had died suddenly at his hotel there to-day.

The duke was married with a fit, and despite the best medical attendance he died without being restored to consciousness. The physician attributes his death to over exertion and fatigue brought on by the duke's indulging too freely in gayety. Only last Tuesday night, in spite of the orders of his physicians, he danced several hours and returned home quite prostrated.

**Private Detectives Pursuing Him. An Arrest to Be Made.**

BIRMINGHAM, Ct., March 27.—Interest in the mysterious Ross Ambley tragedy is revived here by the current rumor that detectives who have been tracing up the case have made some important discovery which may ultimately lead to the arrest of the poor girl's murderer. It is confidently asserted that within a week an important arrest will be made, and that the evidence will be of such a character as to fully justify the commitment of the suspected criminal for trial before the superior court. The general supposition that the search for the murderer was abandoned immediately after the termination of the coroner's investigation is incorrect. Detective Arnold, of Bridgeport, who always held to the belief that William Lewis was the guilty man, spent much time in hunting up clues in Stratford and the Naugatuck valley. Such information as he obtained he promptly turned over to State Attorney Feenber, of Fairfield county, but the evidence was evidently not sufficient to warrant an arrest. It now appears that two private detectives, a man and a woman, have for a long time been re-exploring the field which the earlier detectives were supposed to have gone over so thoroughly, and that new facts have been obtained. The detectives have guarded their movements so carefully that the fact of their having been at work on the case was only known here within the last day or two. The report is that the detectives are in possession of information which disproves Lewis' story that when the murder was committed he was in bed at his employer's house.
