MURDERS HER CHILDREN AND COMMITS SUICIDE.

Phillipsburg, N. J., April 26.—A woman's piercing screams were heard proceeding from a room occupied by Mrs. Barnett, wife of David Barnett, between 8 and 9 o'clock this morning. Two women were the first to reach the door and as they were about to enter it was thrown back with violence and Mrs. Barnett stood before them grasping in her hands a bloody razor. Before the startled women could recover from the shock of the terrible spectacle the insane woman raised her hand and drew the keen blade across her throat, inflicting a frightful wound, from which the blood spurted in a perfect torrent. "Oh, I killed my babies; I couldn't help it," shrieked the murderess and suicide as she threw herself on the bed where her two children with their throats gashed from ear to ear lay dying. Ten minutes later the oldest of the children, a bright little boy, was a corpse and to-night the condition of the other child and that of the mother is such as to almost preclude all hope of their recovery.

The murderous and suicidal acts of the

woman are almost as mysterious in their promptings as the tragedy is terrible and startling. David Barnett had been living in Pittsburgh, but on account of the floods had been compelled to seek work elsewhere. He came here with his family several months ago and obtained work, though not steady employment. He is known as a steady and industrious man and his mother, who also resides with him, says that the family wanted for nothing. This morning about 7 o'clock he left home to work on a building and before doing so bid his wife and children good-by as usual. His wife kissed him affectionately and there was nothing in her manner to indicate that she was mentally disturbed.

An hour later, still preserving a calm demeanor, Mrs. Barnett called her child Willie, aged two years and six months, from a neighbor's where it was playing, telling the little fellow to come and have his face washed. Three ladies saw her at that time, but there was nothing in her manner to excite alarm. Upon entering the house with the child Mrs. Barnett looked all the doors, and proceering her husband's razor cut the throat of the oldest boy and placed the helpless little victim at the foot of the bed. She then took her baby infant of five months from the cradle, gashed its throat with the same weapon and laid it at the head of the bed. As the neighbors entered the woman had thrown herself between the bodies of her children, where she remained bleeding from her wounds until physicians arrived, when she was found unconscious.

The oldest child was found to have had the jugular vein severed and past surgical skill. The gashes in the throats of the mother and infant were stitched up, but upon recovering consciousness Mrs. Barnett frantically tore the wound opening causing the blood to flow afresh. It required the united efforts of several persons to control her while in this deplorable condition. Opiates were administered, and under their influence she was kept partially quiet, though she was more or less violent all day. The physicians attributed the cause of the crime to melancholia, and think it extremely doubtful if she will recover. The younger child will probably die from exhaustion before morning.

The room in which the woman was found presented a sickening appearance. The bed was covered with blood, and the floor and walls were bespattered with the crimson fluid. The blood stained razor was found under a chair where the wretched woman had buried it after inflicting the ghastly wound in her throat. The tragic act caused intense excitement throughout the village, and during the entire day and evening the house was crowded with people.

LUMBER DESTROYED.

Emporium, Pa., May 2.—Forests fires are raging all through this section. At Sterling Run, nine miles from Emporium, several buildings belonging to the tannery company were burned today and a large mill was also destroyed. The village was in imminent danger and was saved by aid from Renovo. At Swissmont, fifteen miles west of here, two mill-

with a large amount of lumber were destroyed.

FIRES IN THE COAL REGION.

Mt. Carmel, Pa., May 2.—A heavy wind storm visited Northumberland Co. today and fanned to the increased fury of the forest fires, which are destroying much valuable timber on the mountains. The works of Charles Woods, together with 5,000 cords of charcoal, were destroyed today. The fires also ignited the Culm bank at the Mine Hill colliery. The mine is in danger and 300 men are thrown out of employment. The towns are befogged by smoke from the burning mountains.
