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

TWENTY-FIVE PERSONS KILLED.

London, July 16.-News has just been received of a terrible railroad accident at Penistone. It seems that an express train while dashing past the station at the rate of thity-five miles an hour struck the rear car of a goods train which had not been properly shunted, completely wrecking the express. Twenty-five per-sons were killed and forty seriously injured.

"This compound, which is still subjected to laboratory experiment and study in the hope that important re-sults will be obtained, presents the clos-est analogy in general reactions with est analogy in general reactions with benzine, yieldnig sulphurio acid, a methyl derivative, etc. It reacts with deketones to form a highly colored substance.

Prof. St. G.
