SHORTHORNS.-Putting on one side all the advantages which have accrued to the breeders of shorthorn cattle, by what in America is called the "boom, which has helped the breeding along, there is still the fact that when farmers want to rear their stock by hand, and make part of the return in dairy produce there has not yet been found the equal of the shorthorn for that purpose. Several breeds, under different circumstances, could be made into better beef, but they wont give milk at the same time; and several breeds under similar circumstances, would give more milk but they can't be made into good beef, and are consequently useless to feed out when barren or to rear as steers. The shorthorn can be reared out of the pall, bred or arable land, will give a fair amount of good milk, and can be fed easily in stall during winter into a salable condition.

FERTILIZER. - A stick of wood burned on the surface mostly passes off in gas, leaving only the ashes; but the same stick, if burned in a coal-pit, excluded from the air, forms a mass of carbon of nearly or quite its original size. Now, all decay of vegetable matter is a slow combustion, and when this is done under the soil, not only are the gasses retained in the soil, but more carbon is formed, and this carbon has the power to appropriate the valuable gasses always present in the atmosphere. The great value of clover as a fertilizer is due, first to the carbon furnished by the decay of the plant, and second to the fine mechanical effect on the soil which renders it porous, so that the atmosphere penetrates it and deposits plant food. It is clear that better fertilizing effects will result from the plowing of it down to decay in the soil. Ordinarily more can be made out of the tops than they are worth for manure, and if rightly managed, the roots will supply the needed fertility.

INDIAN FRITTERS, -Put three tablespoonfuls of flour into a basin, and pour over it sufficient boiling water to getting lumpy. Leave it a little time to cook, and then break into it-without beating them first-the yolks of four eggs and the whites of two, and Sunday evening last winter they were stir and beat all well together. Have ready some boiling lard or clarified dripping. Drop a dessertspoonful of batter in at a time, and fry the fritters of a light brown. They ought to rise so much as to be almost like balls. Serve them on a hot dish, with a spoonful of jam or marmalade dropped in between each fritter.

BROWN FLOUR MUFFINS, -One pint of tepid milk, one-half teaspoonful of salt, half a yeast cake dissolved in half a cup of warm water, one tablespoonful of molasses, half a cup of Indian meal, two cups of Graham flour and one cup of wheat flour. Beat well together. Let the batter rise half an hour before baking. Bake half an hour in a butter cake mould or in mufiln-rings on a griddle. Serve hot.

RANAQUE BUNS .--- One pound of butter, one and a quarter pounds of sugar, two pounds of flour, six eggs, four tablespoonfuls of ground cinnamon. Mix the cinnamon with the flour; rub the butter to a cream, then mix the flour with it. Beat the sugar with the eggs, then altogether as little as possible. Distribute this by the spoonful into rough-looking cakes on buttered tins placed at a little distance apart. This is a very nice lunch-cake.





good-sized dish, a teaspoonful of white sugar, three tablespoonfuls of milk, salt and pepper to taste. Beat as it heats, with a silver fork or wire spoon, Flavor with a little nutmeg. Cook this until it begins to bubble up as you beat it. Pour into a deep dish, surround with sliced egg, and serve.




