If you will turn to the file of the Comal Advertiser, you will find on the 14th of July, 1884, a dispatch from Columbus, O., stating that a large number of imported laborers had been sent down to the Hocking Valley mines, guarded by 130 of Pinkerton's special police, armed with carbines and revolvers. In the Advertiser of July 15, '84, you will find another dispatch stating that the operators (owners) say they "will have 3,000 more foreigners to go into the mines in a few days." The dispatches from that region now portray the condition of things there. Now what are the facts ?

A great monopoly has a protective tariff of 75 cents per ton on bituminous coal, ostensibly for the benefit of the poor laborer, to protect them against what is called pauper labor. Now those miners only struck against having their wages reduced below 70 cents a ton. Thus they only asked as wages five cents less than the entire amount of the protective tar-iff, and they are treated with carbines and revolvers.
