WHEN Dr. S. H. Cox lived in Brooklyn he once kept a dog. Over his ken-nel he wrote: "Cave Canem—teeth inserted here."

This is the way the Massachusetts cook makes her lemon pies: One lemon, three eggs; grate the yellow rind of the lemon and squeeze the juice of the lemon on the sugar; to this add the yelks or the eggs, which should be beaten till light; cover a plate with rich paste, putting a ring around the edge; fill with the above mixture, and bake till the crust is done. Beat the whites of the eggs to a stiff froti, beating in a little powdered sugar; spread this on the top of the pie when it is done, and let it brown.

Nice salad can be made by using veal, and the inexperienced housewife may be reminded that there is as much difference in veal as in beef or chicken. For the salad choose a firm and lean piece, boil it until it is tender and then proceed as if you are making chicken salad, It is a good plan to prepare this some day when you are to have chicken for dinner; then the veal can be boiled in the same kettle, and will be flavored with the chicken broth. Reserve some of the broth when making gravy for the chicken to moisten the salad with.

PEACH SHORTCAKE. - Make a soft dough of one quart of sifted flour mixed with two heaping teaspoonfuls of baking powder, a generous tablespoonful of butter, a little salt, and sufficient sweet milk. Roll out thin, put a layer in a baking-pan, and sprinkle with flour and bit of butter; make four layers like this, using no butter and flour on the top layer. Bake in a quick oven, turn out upside down, remove the layers, and place ripe peaches, cut up and sweetened, between each layer. Serve as a cake, with cream and sugar.

TIMBALE DE SPAGHETTI. - Break some spagnetti into very short lengths and mix with it one or two beaten eggs, according to quantity. When the macaroni is nearly cold, fill with it a plain mould which had been previously buttered and sprinkled with fine bread crumbs. Press the macaroni well down, leaving a hollow in the centre, in this place a well flavored mince of lamb, poultry, or game, fill up the mold with more macaroni, pressing it down compactly. Bake in a moderately quiet oven, turn out and serve very hot.

TRANSPARENT PUDDING.—Butter a pudding-dish and line it with slices of stale sponge cake an inch thick. Put stewed or ripe fresh fruit or preserves in the bottom of the dish upon the cake. Beat to a cream the yolks of eight eggs, quarter of a pound of sugar and half a pound of butter. Flavor to taste with grated nutmeg and stir in lightly the stiflly-beaten whites of the eggs. Pour the mixture over the fruit and bake half an hour. Beat the whites of four eggs to a stiff froth and add four tablespoonfuls of sugar; spread over the pudding after it is baked and return it to the oven for a few minutes to color. To be eaten cold, with or without cream.

BARONESS PUDDING. - Ingredients-Three-fourth pound suet, three-fourth pound raisins, weighed after being stoned; three-fourth pound flour, onehalf pint milk and one-fourth saltspoonful salt. Mode-Chop the suct fine, stone the raisins, cut them in halves, and mix these ingredients with R. E. SELLERS & CO., Prop's, ed and chopped fine; juice and pulp of the salt and flour; moisten with milk, stir the mixture well and tie the pudding in a floured cloth, previously wrung out in boiling water. Put the pudding into a sauce-pan of boiling water and let it boil four and one-half hours. Serve with plain sifted sugar.

> HOMINI CROQUETTES .- To a cupful of boiled hominy add a tablespoonful of melted butter; stir well, then add gradually a cupful of milk, stirring and mashing the hominy until it becomes a soft, smooth paste. Than add a teaspoonful of white sugar and a wellbeaten egg. Roll into eval balls with floured hands, roll in beaten eggs, then in bread crumbs, and fry in boiling lard.


