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THE RED FIRE-FISH.
 The extraordinary creature known to foreign residents by the name of red fire-fish, and to the natives or Ceylon by the title of grini-maha, inhabits the greater part of the tropical seas, from Eastern Africa, through the Indian seas, to Australia.

This fish is remarkable for the singular development of the dorsal and pectoral fins, the latter being of such vast proportionate size that they were formerly supposed to act like the corresponding organs in the flying-fish, and to raise the creature out of the water into the air. Such, however, is not the case, for the rays which carry the connecting strength of bone as in the trug flying-fishes, and are far too weak to serve that purpose. Indeed, the object of this remarkable development is one of the many mysteries with which the inquiring zoologist is surrounded, and which make his task so exhaustively fascinating.

The structure of the entire skeleton is very interesting to comparative anatomists, but is too complicated, and requires too many technical terms to be described here.

The red fire-fish is common off the Ceylonese coast, and is said to be rather valuable as an article of food, its flesh being very white, firm and nutritious. The native fishermen hold this species in some dread, thinking that it can inflict an incurable wound with the sharp spines which arm its person and stand out so boldly in every direction. This idea, however, is without any foundation; for, although the thorny spines may prick the hand deeply and painfully, they carry no poison, and inflict no venomed hurt.

The general color of the red fire-fish is pinky brown, barred with darker brown, and the head is redder than the body. The huge pectoral and dorsal fins are reddish brown, crossed with bold bars of black; the ventral fin is black, dotted with white spots, and the rest of the fins, including that of the tail, are light brown, spotted with black. It is by no means a large fish, being generally about seven or eight inches in length. There are nine or ten species of this genus.

MEXICAN MINING REGIONS.
 Sunday is a great business day, when the streets are crowded with miners, spending their Saturday's pay. It is the great day of the "pelados," as the poorer classes are called, whose costumes of coarse cotton shirt and drawers, particularly the latter, is quite picturesque. On this day the peddlers and sidewalk merchants are in their glory. Zucatecos boasts of three hotels, a theatre, plaza de armas, a cathedral, seven or eight churches, an alameda, one of the handiest in Mexico, electric lights, street cars, and waterworks run by mule power. The Plaza de Armas, though small, is well kept; it is fronted on one side by the Cathedral, on another by the Legislative Hall, and on another by the Executive Mansion. Of this building the following story is told: It was built by the owner of the Mala Noche (bad night) mine, in his time the richest man of Northern Mexico. The mine at the surface paid little or nothing and after the owner had sunk his own capital he continued working it with borrowed money until his credit was gone and things had arrived at such a pass that the mine was in danger of being seized and himself thrown into prison. He then resolved to work it one week longer and if nothing was struck to run away. The week passed and nothing was struck. On the afternoon of the last day he ordered his horses brought for flight at daybreak. He passed the night, it is "mala noche," between hope and despair, when just before daylight a miner came from the mine bringing a "gallo" (a piece of rich rock) and the news that a bonanza had been struck. The bonanza proved to be an immense one. In memory of that night the mine was called Mala Noche.

A NOVEL SIGHT.
 Superintendent Crandell, of the Troy and Boston Railroad, was at Lake George, recently, and witnessed a novel sight. Mr. Crandell and others on the steamer Ticonderoga had left Caldwell, and when a short distance out in the lake they saw what resembled smoke on the surface of the water about half a mile northward. In two or three minutes a jet of cloud appeared to descend from above the lake and unite with the smoke on the water. The cloud grew in dimensions until it resembled a large funnel, and extended from the surface of the lake high up into the sky. It was in plain sight to those on the steamer for fully fifteen minutes, when it gradually dissolved. There was a slight rainfall in the vicinity of the water-spout, but not a drop fell upon the boat.

PEONAGE IN MEXICO.
 The system of peonage still exists in Mexico. In case of debt the debtor's personal services, or wages earned from another employer, belong to his creditors until the debt is paid; but it has been modified of late years, so that it does not now apply to debts amounting to over ten dollars. If a man trusts another for more than that sum, he does so at his own peril, if he has no property. He can command his services up to ten dollars' worth, but no further.

CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVIDENCE.
 To show us that "truth is stranger than fiction" the following incident is given, and claimed by a legal writer on the subject to be fully authenticated. It occurred in an English coast town, in the latter part of the seventeenth century. Two brothers were lodging at an inn in the town. They had come into possession of some property, concerning the disposition or division of which they could not agree, and had frequent quarrels. One night they had been drinking hard, and had become so quarrelsome that friends were obliged to interfere to prevent a fight. At last they were quieted, and retired without further disturbance. They slept in a double-bedded room. In the first gray dawn of the morning one of the brothers was awakened by a violent attack of bleeding at the nose. Arising and partially dressing himself, he walked out to the seashore. Here he was so unfortunate as to surprise a band of smugglers in the act of secreting a boat-load of brandy-casks, who made him their prisoner. Not wanting to kill him, and not daring to let him go back to the town, lest he might betray them to the excise officers, they carried him off to their ship, without the harbor, and took him with them to the Barbadoes. Meanwhile, the other brother had been aroused by the horror-stricken inmates of the tavern who found him asleep, his brother's bed being empty and the pillow drenched with blood. The trail of blood-spots was followed to the seashore, and the conclusion was inevitable that the one brother had murdered the other during the night, and had dragged the dead body out and thrown it into the sea. The supposed murderer was tried, condemned and hanged on the strength of the testimony of the facts against him. Happily for him he had a most elevated and loving sweetheart, who had not only made every effort to secure his release, and to console him when his death had become certain, but had hired a servant to cut down his lifeless body as soon as possible, and bring it to her, that she might see it decently buried. What was her astonishment to find when about to place this poor victim of circumstances in his coffin that he was not quite dead. Medical aid was summoned, the man revived. Then, as there was great danger that the law would seize upon him again if the fact of his resuscitation were known, he was hastily wedded to his devoted lady love, and the pair took passage that night for the West Indies. Landing at the Barbadoes the first person the man met was the brother for whose murder he had so recently been tried and convicted by the law.

A DISTRESSING CASE.
 A young American lawyer was retained as advocate in a case as to which, not feeling himself sufficiently prepared to plead, he was very desirous of obtaining a postponement. As, however, the court had already protracted its session beyond the usual period, in consequence of an unusual amount of business, and as the jury were getting impatient to be released from their dress, he was well aware that it would be impossible to procure such a postponement unless he could allege some extraordinary cause. Fortunately—or unfortunately as the result proved—he had a lively imagination, and quickly formed a plan which he was sure would be successful. Rising, dejectedly, with his handkerchief to his eyes, he addressed the court in great apparent emotion, "May it please the court, I have just heard of the dangerous illness of my venerable mother, who is lying at the point of death. In such circumstances, much as I regret protracting an already lengthened session, I must request that this case be postponed. My feelings are so powerfully agitated that I should be unable to do justice to the case, feeling as I do that my proper place is at the bedside of my mother."

The pathetic appeal was completely successful. A feeling of earnest sympathy for the afflicted counsel filled all hearts, and the jurors, though anxious to return to their families, were not sufficiently hard of heart to wish to have the business of the court proceed at such a sacrifice of personal feelings. The judge, who was a tender-hearted man, had risen, and was about to grant the request of the counsel, when the deep hush was broken by a shrill voice which proceeded from a lady in a Quaker bonnet, who was bending over the railing of the gallery. It was the mother of the eloquent counsel, who, so far from being at the point of death, came without her son's knowledge, to hear him plead. "Timothy, Timothy," she exclaimed, in a voice which could be heard all over the court, "How often have I chastised thee for lying!" The case was not postponed.

"A ROPE ROUND THE NECK."
 "The origin of this expression, as well as its meaning, has lately been variously explained. The practice, according to Demosthenes, prevailed in the popular assembly of the Greek State of Locris, in Italy. There, according to the constitution framed, it is said by Zalmoxis, any citizen who proposed a new law did so with a rope round his neck, and if the proposal failed to obtain a majority of the votes the proposer was at once strangled. This practice kept the constitution in its original purity for 200 years.

WAR ON THE ROLLER SKATES.
 Wilkesbarre, Oct. 13.—The ministers attached to Wyoming district of the Wyoming conference of the Methodist Episcopal church at the district conference on Saturday passed a resolution denouncing the roller skating craze now so prevalent throughout the northern states. They take occasion to warn their people against the amusement as being of questionable moral tendency, and ask the church in general to take action against the growing evil.

 Pittsburg, October 14.—The wonderful flow of the Christie well has completely unsettled the oil market, and when the exchange opened this morning there was a stampede to sell; such an intense excitement had rarely been witnessed, and as values tottered and fell under the heavy weight of large bundles of certificates thrown out, brokers, who in times past have stepped in and saved the market, stood with blanched faces, powerless to check the decline.
