THE HORSESHOE SUPERSTITION.

The origin of the horseshoe superstition has never been satisfactorily explained. THE FIRST SAW-MILLS.

The old practice of making boards was to split up the logs with wedges, and inconvenient as the practice was, it was no easy matter to persuade the world that the thing could be done in any better way. Saw-mills were first used in Europe in the fifteenth century, but so late as 1655, an English emigrant, having seen a saw-mill in France thought it a novelty which deserved particular description. The first saw mill was established by a Dutchman, in 1663; but the public outcry against the new fangled machine was so violent that the proprietor was forced to decamp with greater expedition than ever did a Dutchman before.
