SCOTT LAW VOID.

Declared Unconstitutional by the Ohio Supreme Court.

Columbus, Ohio, Oct. 28.—The Ohio Supreme Court to-day rendered a decision declaring the famous Scott law unconstitutional. This law, passed by the last General Assembly, imposed a tax of \$200 per annum upon the sale of vinous and \$100 upon the sale of malt liquor. The long relation for the repeal or modification of this law during the session of the present Assembly last winter will be well remembered.
