Felker was appointed for Mifflinburg charge, Rev. Diven for Lock Haven, Rev. Finckel for Rays charge, Rev. Aurand for Aaronsburg charge, Rev. Koser for Boals-burg charge, Rev. Furst for Zion and Warroirs Mark charges. With this arrangement, whereby a single committee man has charge of an entire field and answerably by a written report for this field at next conference, we hope to reduce the number of vacancies and lessen

ifficulties in making pastoral selections. Cairo, Oct. 31.-The Government has received trustworthy advices to the effect that on Sept. 28 there were 140,000 rebels surrounding Khartoum and that active preparations were being made to attack the place.
