VICTIM OF A MURDER.

A Misterious Note Found Inside the Trunk.

St. Louis, April 14.—A sensation was caused in the Southern hotel to-day by the discovery of a horribly mutilated body of a man packed in a trunk, which was taken out of a room. The stench from the trunk caused the discovery. The hotel register shows that on March 30 a gentleman registered as Walter H. 30 a gentleman registered as Walter H. Lenox Maxwell, M. D., from London, and was assigned to that room. On opening the trunk it was found that the head of the man was severed from his body, and written on a paper inside the trunk were the words: "So perish all traitors to the cause." The trunk and its contents were

taken to the morgue.

Maxwell is described as a very girlish looking blonde young man, wearing a dark woolly, cutaway suit of English stuff. He was seen in Camp Army frequently with a dark looking gentleman, about 5 feet, 10 inches in height. This gentleman registered as C. Arthur Preller, of London. A telegram had previously been received from Preller, asking whether Maxwell was a guest at the house. He answered in the affirmative,

and he soon came on. Both men occupied the same room.

Maxwell left the hotel a week ago Sunday night, but he had paid his full week's board promptly, and it was supposed that he would return any day. No suspicion attached to his absence until the horrible smell called attention to his room and led to the opening of the trunk. led to the opening of the trunk. A second trunk was found to contain numerond trunk was found to contain numerous articles, among which were found Maxwell's London address as No. 14 Paper Building, Temple, London, and an envelope addressed in his hand writing to Rev. D. G. A. Lewis, B. A., curator of St. Paul's Morley, Leeds, Yorkshire, England

He came over on the steamer Cephalonia, from England. Preller has a Russian passport, vized by the Russian amsian passport, vized by the Russian ambassador in London in 1878, and a passpost in 1883 for Spain and Mexico, vized by the Spanish minister, and signed Granville. Seven trunks, four valises and a hat box were left behind at the hotel, and the contents, clothing, etc., are valued at hundreds of dollars. This is believed to make the theory of a hoax unteneble, and the belief is that the corpse is either that of Maxwell or Preller.

WHY SEALSKIN IS EXPENSIVE.

There are only four fur seal grounds of any importance in the world—the islands of St. George and St. Paul in Behring's Sea, which belong to the territory of Alaska, and the other two are the Commander Islands, lying 700 | Crowl's Patent Iron Roofing miles west of these in the Czar's dominions. The first two islands produce the greatest number of seals. During the months of May and June they come to the islands in flocks of thousands. Then the great slaughter takes place to supply the fashionable world with sealskin sacques. The Alaska Seal Fur Company kill about 100,000 seals annually. They pay the natives forty cents for each seal they kill and skin. SELLERS No firearms are used, as it would drive the animals away and spoil the islands as a seal resort. They are killed with a single blow of a club on the head. Then the skins are quickly removed, partially cured and prepared for shipment to

It takes a great deal of care and work to bring the fur to the rich and glossy perfection it shows when wrapped around the form of a fashionable lady. First, all the coarse hairs are removed and then the fur is dyed the shade required. But it takes experts to do this, and in London only the art seems to be well understood. Now, the value of sealskins depends entirely upon their successful treatment and the color and smoothness of a permanent nature attained. It takes three of the sealskins to make a full-sized cloak. They should last the wearer seven years without losing their rich color, and at the same time retain their perfect appearance. The best cloaks are worth over \$400 apiece. The finest fur comes from young seals, between the ages of 2 and 3 years. When they get beyond the age of 4 the fur becomes stiff somewhat. It appears that the transparency of the air is prodigiously increased when a certain quantity of water is uniformly diffused through it. Mountaineers predict a change of weather when, the air being calm, the Alps, covered with perpetual snow, seem on a sudden to be nearer the observer, and their outlines are marked with great distinctness on the azure sky. The same condition of the atmosphere renders distant sounds more audible.
