# GENERAL BARRIOS' DEATH. Assassinated on the Battlefield Through

the Intrigues of Zaldivar.

Washington, April 20 .- Advices were received here to-day from Guatemala describing briefly the scene of Gen. Barrios' death. The contending armies had hardly begun the battle when the Guatemalan commander was killed. He was not leading the troops on the battlefield, but was passing leisurely along at some distance in the rear of the troops, when an onslaught was made suddenly on him by the enemy. Barrios fell mortally wounded by a bullet, and died in a few minutes. A desperate struggle was made to capture his body from his bodyguard, and twenty Guatemalan soldiers were killed before the enemy were repulsed and the attempt abandoned. It was in this fight that Barrios' son fell. It is common belief that Barrios was deliberately assassinated by the intrigues of Zaldivar, and that the responsibility for the crime rests with him. To-day papers were also received from Guatemala containing a proclamation by Zalvidar, making the absurd claim that he had the promise of protection from Mexico and the United States, and that twenty American men-of-war and gunboats would be sent in his defense against Barrios. The body of Barrios was taken to Guatemala

and buried with impressive ceremonies. The people were profoundly moved by the disaster and show great sorrow at the death of their President, to whose leadership they looked for brilliant naitorial from the Union De Centro America, a Guatemalan newspaper. It is published in the official columns of the paper: The following will convey some idea of Zaldivar in the late affair of Central America. It is a fact that he was placed in the Presidency of Salvador in 1876 by Gen. Barrios after his triumph in that republic, besides which he was sustained and favored by the General's friendship. Four months ago, when Zaldivar was in Guatemala, he said, in congratulations to Barrios: 'I am proud of my gratitude. All I am and all I am worth I owe to my friend Barrios. I will ever be in accord with him, especially on the question of the union of Central America.' After the union had been decreed in Guatemala, Saldivar announced: 'I am a unionist at heart and your friend, and to press this title I will make watever sacrifice is necessary.' At the same time that he was writing this he was soliciting the intervention of Mexico to prevent the union, and he was distributing proclamations throughout Salvador calling Barrios a tyrant and a dictator. In a word, Zaldivar offered officially and pub licly to cooperate with the union of Central America and to be faithful to Barrios, and what he really did was, by intrigue and underhand dealings unrecogaized by war, to assassinate Barrios, to whom he owed position, and, more than that, his word of honor. A HORRIBLE DOUBLE MURDER.

Greenwich, Conn., April 21 .- Barclay Johnson, son of a prominent railroad lawyer, while walking in the woods with his mother and sister this afternoon, shot and killed them both and then killed himself. After the double tragedy he placed the revolver to his right eye and sent the builet through his brain. Johnson was insane.
