I hope soon to be able to get at these matters, but it will require a little time.' The President's face broke into a smile as he concluded, "I wish you out there could be like the rest of us. "All we ask," rejoined Mr. Caine, "is that the law shall be impartially administered." "You are entitled to that," said the President, "and so far as I am concerned I shall see that it is so. I will give these matters my attention as early as possible."
