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

USE MORE LEMONS .- Bear in mind that lemons are the most useful fruit in domestic ecomomy. The juice of half a lemon in a teacup of strong black coffee, without sugar, will often cure a sick headache. Lemon juice and salt will remove ordinary iron rust. If the hands are stamed there is nothing that will remove the stains so well as lemon. Cut a lemon in half and apply the cut surface as if it were soap. Lemon juice is also a remedy for rheumatism and for the so-called biliousness of spring. In the latter case, take the raice of a lemon before breakfast, the pulp may also be eaten, avoiding every particle of skin. Lemon juice with sugar mixed very thick and taken at intervals relieves coughs. It must be very acid as well as sweet.

NICE SWEETBBRADS. - Sweetbreads prepared in this was are very nice: Soak them in cold water for an hour and then remove skin and blood vessels. For two sweetbreads put a pint of water on the fire in a small saucepan, with salt, a tablespoonful of vinegar, a few slices of onions, six peppercorns, two cloves, six sprigs of parsley, one of thyme and a bay leaf; boil two minutes; drop the sweetbreads in; boil one minute longer and then take them off. Drop them immediately in cold water, and leave them in it from five minutes to an hour. Knead together two ounces of butter, one teaspoonful of shallots and parsley well chopped, a little salt and pepper. Put the whole in a stewpan with the sweetbreads on it and lay a few thin slices of bacon upon them; set the pan on the fire; add half a cup of broth and the same quantity of white wine and simmer until done. Dish the sweet-breads, skim the fat from the sauce, strain it over the sweetbreads and serve with mushrooms or cauliflower.

A GYPSY TABLE, -- Cut first a paper pattern of a clover leaf, one foot from the center to the edge; get some one to cut this out of a half-inch board for you. Then take three broom handles of equal length, saw off the tops so they will fit on the board flat, bring them together in the center and fasten strongly with wire or screws, then spread them at the top and bottom and saw the bottom edges a little slanting, so they will stand firm; put the top on with screws or nails. Cover the top with either flannel, felt or plush of any desired color, paint the legs with bronze, silver or gold, which can be got at any paint-shop at a small cost, and tack around the edge of the table, with brass-headed tacks, the crocheted edge made of No. 40 linen thread.

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
