3,000 SMALL POX CASES.

Montreal, Sept. 27 .- At a meeting of the board of health last evening it was stated that there were known to be 3,000 cases of small-pox in the city of the most virulent type. Over one hundred dwellings and stores were closed during the day by order of the Provincial Board of Health. This was brought about by the detectives employed to ferret out cases. There were 250 deaths during the week.
