BEEF Sour .- One pound of beef, two quarts of water, one cup rice or barley, salt to season. Put in a souppot, let it boil slow and steady for two hours. In another vessel have a good soup-bone, leek, parsley, and onlon, a potato, half a carrot, turnip; let it boil as long as the meat. When ready to set the table, strain the soup off the bones and vegetables into the other; stir up when ready to put on the table; take two eggs, beat well in the soup-tu-reen, and add the soup gradually so the eggs will not curdle. Always boil bones and vegetables separate and strain them and you will have good as well as cheap

COMPOTE OF CHESNUTS .- Remove the husks from about fifty chestnuts, and put them to simmer gently in quart of milk and water until done to the degree of a floury potato; they must be then drained in a sleve, and bruised in a sugar-boiler containing twelve ounces of sugar boiled till it pearls on the surface; flavor with pounded vanilla, and, after working all together, rub through a coarse wire sieve on to a dish. dish up this compote, first pile up half a pint of firmly-whipped cream in the center of the compotier; with the fingers gently strew the vermicellied chestnuts upon this in a conical form; garnish round the base with a compote of oranges with maraschine. This is a very delicious dish.

FRICASSEE OF CALF'S LIVER .- TWO pounds liver, cut into strips more than half an inch thick, and as long as your finger; two young onions, minced: one glass wine; pepper, salt and parsley; butter or drippings from frying; one half cup good gravy. Dredge the sliced liver with flour, and fry to a light brown quickly, and turning often. Mince the onions and parsley, and heat them in the gravy in a saucepan; put in the fried liver, let all stew together for ten minutes, when pour in the wine, and as soon as this is hot, serve-the liver piled neatly and the gravy poured over it.

POMEGRANATE-WATER ICE. - Break carefully four ripe pomegranates, put the pips of the fruit in a plate, and, when the whole is freed trom their husks, bruise them with a wooden spoon in small quantities at a time on a hair sieve to extract their juice, which must run through a sieve into a basin; to a pint of the juice add the juice of two lemons, a pint of very strong syrup, a teaspoonful of orange-flower water, the rubbed rind of an orange, and a few drops of cochineal; mix, and freeze as usual.

CINNAMON BISCUITS .- Mix one pound sugar with twelve yelks of eggs and a teaspoonful of essence of cinnamon; work the batter vigorously with a wooden spoon for a quarter of an nour, and then mix in the twelve whites whipped firm, four ounces potato flour and four ounces best flour; fill small paper cases with this, sugar them over, and when the sugar is melted; bake them in an oven of moderate heat of a light color.

This is a good way to use up pieces of meat left from dinner.

CHRYSANTHEMUMS IN NOVEMBER. -A lover of chrysanthemums says that the propagation of these royal flowers should be made in November. The cuttings require two months to root when placed over gentle bottom heat. They may then be put in three-inch pots in a soil composed of three parts of well-rotted sod and one part of decomposed cow manure mixed with sand. As they increase in size, place them in larger pots-a twelve inch pot being the right size for flowering plants. They require much water during the summer months, and must be watered twice a day. Once a week an application of liquid manure is beneficial. Chrysanthemums cultivated in pots give the finest blooms.

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
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
