

A DRUGGIST'S DESPERATE FIGHT.

Indianapolis, Dec. 30.—Luther Cline, a druggist at Broad Ripple, to-night killed one of two desperadoes who attacked him and his wife just after closing his store for the night. One decoyed Cline into his store, and the other passed into the family room where the wife was sitting. Cline, as he reached the store, looked back and saw his wife struggling with villain No. 2, who was apparently choking her to death.

When Cline attempted to go to her assistance villain No. 1 shot him in the head and then closed with him, grabbing him around the neck and shooting a second time. The shot missed its mark. Finally Cline secured the pistol, and shot his assailant through the head, killing him instantly. The accomplice fled, and search is being made for him. Cline is shot in the face, the ball passing in under the mouth.

Scientific.

Still another wonderful use has been found for electricity. Recently electrodes connected with a dynamo of the power of forty ordinary Daniell cells were put into forty gallons of fresh milk, and in exactly 4/5 minutes the fluid was, as dairymen say, churned, the butter rising upon the surface. The quantity obtained was fully equal to that procured in the ordinary way, and the quality perfect.

Prof. J. A. Harrison of Virginia says that the fertility of the negro dialect is really wonderful, not only in the ingenious distortion of words, by which new and startling significances is given to common English words, but more especially in the imitation of animal utterances. It is an ear language altogether. The only wonder is how the negro could have so truly caught the swiftly uttered sounds about him.

A Massachusetts paper mill has adopted a safety paper which will make it extremely difficult for any one to tamper with bank notes or checks printed upon it. The coloring matter of the paper is so prepared that the application of any chemical to remove ink will permanently change the color of the paper, and an ingenious device is added which betrays at once any attempt to make an erasure. Between the two the enterprising forger will be sure to come to grief.

It is said by some one curious in those matters, that there is not a chimney nor a cooking stove in Havana; not a carpeted room nor a feather pillow. This is but another way of saying that, with good sense, the people there know how to adapt their domestic economy to the calorific character of the climate; but here in our Northern cities the cooking stove, the chimney, the carpet and other heat-engendering paraphernalia are in full blast just the same when the mercury is 99° in the shade as when it is below zero. Which is the barbarian?

If, says La Natura, one should write upon a sheet of white paper with chloride of platinum no mark would be visible, as the liquid is quite colorless. But hold the same sheet of paper over the vapor of mercury, and the metal it received in the former operation will be brought out in dark tints. Several surprising effects may be produced by utilizing that fact. If the experiment be reversed not less marvellous results may be obtained. First expose a drawing or writing to the gases of mercury to charge the lines with mercury. Then bring the drawing or writing in contact with a solution of platinum, and the drawing or writing will be reproduced upon it line for line.

Stanley says that African sunlight, with all its great heat, appeared to him as a superior moonlight, judging from its effects on scenery. He attributes the apparent solemnity of the "solemn-looking hills," of which he so often speaks, to this peculiar sunshine. "It deepens the shadows and darkens the dark-green foliage of the forest, while it imparts a wan appearance or a cold reflection of light to naked slopes and woodless top hills. Its effect is a chill austerity, an indescribable solemnity, a repelling unsociability."

Wauklyn and Cooper's test for the purity of air is conducted by taking a strongly alkaline solution of permanganate of potash, the strength of which is accurately determined. A known volume of air is then allowed to act upon the solution, which is heated nearly to the temperature of boiling water. After the solution is allowed to act in the air the strength of the solution is again determined. The loss of strength of the solution represents the amount of oxygen consumed by a known volume of air. The purer the air the less the consumption of oxygen.

A small, light compound engine, remarkable in point of weight, is described in the English papers. It is made of steel and phosphor bronze, the whole built with the utmost lightness, the rods and shafting and all parts possible being bored out to reduce weight. At a speed of only 300 revolutions a minute over 30 horse-power is indicated, and the weight is but 105 pounds all told. This engine would give fully 30 horse-power actual, at a piston speed of 500 ft. a minute; at least, such are the figures and calculations set forth. It is further stated that the size is 3 1/2 inch pressure, 7 1/2 low pressure, and five stroke.

The Wood Worker mentions a new process of toughening timber, by which whitewood can be made so tough as to require a cold chisel to split it. This result is reached by steaming the timber and submitting it to end pressure, technically "upsetting" it, thus compressing the cells and fibres into one compact mass. It is the opinion of those who have experimented with the process, that wood can be compressed seventy-five per cent, and that some timber which is now considered unfit for use in such work as carriage building, could be made valuable by this means, and more especially since the rapid consumption of our best ash and hickory will sooner or later render some substitute necessary.
