Wauklyn and Cooper's test for the purity of air is conducted by taking a strongly alkaline solution of permanganate of potash, the strength of which is accurately determined. A known volume of air is then allowed to act upon the solution, which is heated nearly to the temperature of boiling water. After the solution is allowed to act in the air the strength of the solution is again determined. The loss of strength of the solution represents the amount of exygen consumed by a known volume of air. The purer the air the less the consumption of oxygen.

A small, light compound engine, remarkable in point of weight, is described in the English papers. 
