Among the Samoans, the orange blossom was regarded as a symbol of a prosperous marriage, a circumstance which is partly to be accounted for by the fact that in the East the orange tree bears ripe fruit and blossoms at the same time.

An ingenious method of sheep stealing is being practised in Oregon. It consists in suspending a rope made to a loop and slip-knot from a tree branch overhanging a sheep path in the woods. The animals put their heads in the noose and are held till the thief can come in the night and carry away the game.

Ten physicians, who have had an opportunity for personal observation, report diversely as to the deadliness of leprosy. Four feel certain that it is absolutely incurable, three are in doubt, and three believe that chaulmoogra oil may prove a specific, as they have seen remarkable results from its use.

The expression of the eyes of persons killed by violence is considered an important matter in criminal jurisprudence, but its value has been greatly lessened by reason of its evanescent nature. A French scientist has found a means of restoring the life-like expression. It consists in applying a few drops of glycerine and water to the corner.

In a recent paper, Sir John Lubbock says that ants of the same nest, however large it may be, have a means of recognizing each other not easily explained. The recognition is immediate and complete, even after an absence of a year from the nest. Concerning the longevity of ants, he said he had kept two queen ants for twelve years.

Besides numerous tools and the products of manufacturing trades, there may be recognized on ancient Egyptian wall painting weavers, ropemakers, the preparers of paper and of linen cloth, ship carpenters with hand-saw and auger, and the cutters of bows and lances, who employed adzes quite similar to those still in use.

Doctors say that mothers who take pride in the weight of their newly-born children should weigh them as soon as possible after birth. Children lose weight during the first three days of life, and the loss sometimes amounts to twelve ounces or more. It takes them nearly a week to regain the weight they had at the time of birth.

During the campaign against Riel, Captain Peters carried a camera on his saddle, obtaining sixty splendid pictures, including a dozen taken during the battles of Batoche and Fish Creek all under fire. No other photographer has yet accomplished taking a picture under fire. One was taken during a volley from the rebels' pits, about 150 yards distant.

According to an old belief it was supposed that devils could at any moment assume whatever form they pleased that would most conduce to the success of any contemplated enterprise they might have in hand; and hence the charge of being a devil, so commonly brought against innocent and harmless persons in former years, can easily be understood.

The immense gun constructed at Elswick for the British Government has a total weight of 300 tons, being considerably in excess of previous undertakings. Its length is stated at some forty-four feet, though with an extreme diameter at the breech of but five feet six inches, a very elongated chase or barrel tapering down to twenty-eight inches, with a slight swelling at the muzzle.

It is said that the first restrictive liquor law ever passed in this country was enacted in a little town in Rhode Island, and read as follows: "Every saloon-keeper who sells more than one gallon of liquor to a minor, shall be fined \$1 and costs." The first temperance pledge remembered in circulation in New England, was thus worded: "I solemnly swear to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors on all occasions except on training days, working days, banquets and other great occasions."
