Section 1—That the High Constable and Police shall receive such compensation as Councils may fix for the arrest of persons violating the Borough ordinances.

Section 2—The compensation of the Street Commissioner and Clerk of Councils shall be fixed by the Council, and they shall receive no other compensation for any services, either from the Borough or from individuals.

Section 3—If any of the Borough officers receiving compensation from the Borough or fees for services, shall take or exact from any person any fee or compensation not allowed by the Borough ordinances, shall upon conviction be removed from their respective offices.

Section 1—That it shall be the duty of the High Constable or any police of the Borough upon complaint being made to him or upon his own knowledge, of any violation of any of the ordinances of the Borough now in force or hereafter to be passed, forthwith to prefer complaint to the Burgess of the Borough, who shall issue his warrant for the party or parties complained of, proceed with, hear, and dispose of the case as provided by the several ordinances.

Section 2—That any person aggrieved by any violation of any ordinance of the Borough now in force or hereafter to be passed, may make complaint to the Burgess, who shall issue his warrant for the party or parties complained of, hear, and dispose of the case as provided by the several ordinances.

Section 1—Any person or persons who shall be found on the streets or alleys or public places of the Borough making any noise or confusion or using any obscene or profane language, thereby disturbing the peace and good order of the citizens, shall be liable to arrest by the Police or any other Borough officer, and upon conviction before the Burgess shall pay a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars, and upon failure to pay the fine and all costs shall be committed to the County Jail or Lock-Up for a period of ten days.

Section 2—Any person or persons who shall be found intoxicated in any street, alley, or public place, in the Borough, shall be liable to arrest by any officer of the Borough, and upon conviction before the Burgess shall pay a fine not exceeding Five Dollars, and upon failure to pay the fine and costs, shall be committed to the County Jail or Lock-Up for a period not exceeding five days.

Section 3—That the assembling together of men and boys, or other persons on the streets, street corners, alleys, and upon crossings, or the pavements in the Borough, in such a manner as to obstruct streets, crossings, or pavements, (except some when or where some lawful public meeting may be held) is hereby declared to be a nuisance and unlawful, and it shall be the duty of the Borough officers to forthwith disperse all such persons as aforesaid, and upon failure to disperse, after notice, shall be arrested, and upon conviction before the Burgess shall pay a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars, and upon failure to pay the fine and costs shall be committed to the County Jail or Lock-Up for a period not exceeding five days.
