

Engraving on Glass.-The hard point for inscribing and engraving rare stones is doubtless older than the lathe, and was certainly used in engraving glass during classical and mediaval times. The Flemish, Dutch, and Germans, within the last three centuries, used it with great success, as testified by examples of their work still remaining. Diamond or other hard stone pointssimilar to those used by some glass carvers of the present-may be employed in engraving glass and handled in the same way as ordinary gravers for metal or wood. The glass should be coated with a mixture of gum and milk, on which, when dry, a pattern may be drawn or transferred previous to engraving. Very fine line and hatching and stipple effects can be produced by this method. Some of the specimens in the Slade collection of the British museum are exquisitely done. The great drawback to such engraving. when delicately finished, is that it cannot be well seen unless it is held close to the eye and in a good light.

Professor James Warren is announced as the inventor of a new process of reducing ores by the aid of electricity. While examining a piece of gold-bearing quartz the Professor accidentally let it fall into one of the dynamos, which was in motion at the time. On looking for the piece of quartz the next day he found it in the dynamo, and, to his surprise, the gold in the quartz had been melted and had run to one side of the rock, forming a beautiful button. He immediately instituted a series of experiments and succeeded in evolving a process by which gold, silver and copper can be instantly smelted from concentrations by a powerful electric shock, almost equaling in intensity a stroke of lightning. The successful application of this process to other ores, as lead and antimony, is also expected.

In countries having marked winter seasons earthquakes are found to be more frequent in winter than in summer. Dr. Knott, of the Seismological Society of Japan, finds only two possible meteorological reasons for thisone being the stress of accumulated snow and the other that of high barometric pressure during the cold sea-

HOME-MADE FRENCH BREAD,-Wash perfectly clean half a pound of potatoes, and then steam them without removing the skins. Mash them thoroughly with half a pint of flour, half a pint of tepid water and half an ounce of sait. When well mixed, put away in a place where the temperature is 78 degrees of Fahrenheit for one hour. Then add and mix with it half a pint of good yeast and put away in the same place for nine hours. It may require somewhat longer than nine hours, or a little less, but it may be known in this way: the compound will, after a while, gradually and slowly foam for some time and then begin to fall; as soon as it begins to fall, mix a little tepid water with it, and strain through a sieve; throw away potato skins and eyes; mix what is strained with two pounds of flour and sufficient tepid water to make an ordinary dough. Put it away again in the same place until it cracks on the top, which will occur in about an hour. Then put six pounds of flour on the pasteboard and make a hole in the centre place in this a little tepid water and cracked dough; salt to taste; knead the whole well with water enough to make an ordinary dough. To knead it well it is necessary to raise the dough, or part it, and then throw it back with force on the paste-board. The more the dough is kneaded the lighter the bread. Then shape the loaves, let rise, and bake in a quick oven. To shape loaves of French bread, divide the dough, as soon as kneaded, in as many parts as you want loaves; then knead each part, one after the other, so as to form a ball; then, by rolling and pulling it, give it an elongated, sausage-like shape. 
