A mounted man would offer large odds in shirts or blankets for a pair of spurs or a bridle; and while in anxious quest of a pair of shoes I fell heir to a case of cavalry halfboots, which I would gladly have exchanged for the object of my search. For a change of underclothing and a pot of French mustard I owe grateful thanks to the major of the Twelfth Pennsylvania envalry, with regrets that I could not use his library. Whisky was of course, at a high premium, but a keg of "lager"—a drink less popular then than

now—went begging in our company.

The Proper Way to Lick a Stamp. "The average ingenuity of the human family," said a retail stamp clerk at the postoffice, "must be very small. Why, there is not one person in 500 who has gumption enough to put a stamp on a letter. I see the process gone through with about a thousand times a day, and I ought to know. All the people at my window begin by putting the stamps into their mouths, closing their mouths, rolling their eyes like a man trying to swallow a pill, and moving the stamps around in their mouths until they are perfectly saturated with saliva. They then lay them on the corner of their envelopes and bring their clenched fists down on them like a pile-driver. Then comes the profanity. 'See here, clerk,' they say, 'this stamp is no account. Won't you please put a little muscilage on it? So strange that they can't put enough mucilage on the stamps to make

them stick. "Now, the trouble is that these people lick and chew all the gum off the stamp before they try to affix it; and if the gum were an inch thick, it would meet with the same fate. The way to put a stamp on is to moisten the gum very slightly, and then lay it on the envelope, and with the end of the forefinger slip it back and forwards once or twice until the saliva and gum are mixed. I have been licking stamps for forty years, but I have never yet met with one which would not adhere if it was treated in this way."—Chicago

Retail Merchants and Their Bad Debts. The retail merchants of west New York are getting readysto try a new plan of disposing of had debts. They will co-operate to have a bill auction, and accounts which they have not been able to collect will be sold to the highest bidder. There are a good many people who do not pay their debts who would pay them if they knew that their names and liabilities were to become public property in the event of non-payment, and a firm enforcement of the western New York method would probably very soon render an actual auction ecessary. There ought to be a presumption in favor of publicity in every case willful attempt to deprive a creditor of that which is justly due him, and nobody will object to the plan who pays or honestly intends to pay his debts. So it may even be adopted outside of western New York.-Philadelphia
