HOUSEHOLD.

WHEN hard finished walls have been kalsomined the soiled coats should be washed or scraped off before a new one s put on. This is the most disagreeable part of the process. The furniture should be covered, as the lime makes spots that are removed with difficulty, especially upon black walnuts.

A DEAL table is the foundation, which must be covered with colored glazed cambric. Over this is a cover of linen, ornamented with designs in cross-stitch worked with crewel or embroidery silk; the spaces between the designs have threads drawn to form an insertion. The border corresponds, and is edged with a handsome fringe. The drapery is arranged in plaits, with a cross-stitch design on each. A pretty circular cushion is placed in front of the glass; this is of cambric, the color of the lining of table cover, ornamented at the top with an applique design, edged with a flounce of lace finished by a ruche of satin ribbon. The hairpin cushion, a very necessary article of a lady's toilet table, is a little basket, filled by a cushion covered with knitting and ornamented by a drape of embroidered cloth. This same design for a table can be carried out in cretonne. It looks exceedingly pretty at trifling cost. The cover can then be edged with a box-plaited quilting instead of fringe, if desired.

THE following is a very delicious pudding, the recipe for which I begged from Mrs. Marshall of the school of cookery for you, writes Miss Madge in London Truth: Pour half a pint of warm cream on the crumbs of two French rolls, two ounces of castor sugar, one ounce of vanilla chocolate and five large eggs beaten up. Always use a rather low mould with a pipe in for this pudding, and after having buttered it, line it with well-buttered paper; pour in it the mixture and steam it for twenty minutes, or half an hour; then turn it out and remove the paper; pour chocolate sauce over it and serve a rice compote of fruit in the center. And this is how the chocolate sauce is made: To three ounces of vanilla chocolate add two ounces of castor sugar and a good half pint of water. When it boils stir in a tablespoonful of creme de riz that has been mixed in a little cold water. Boll all together till quite smooth; then tammy and use.

HERE is a savory dish of rice: Put one-quarter of a pound of well-washed rice in a saucepan with enough cold water to cover it, and let it boil for five minutes. Drain it and put it back in the saucepan with three-quarters of a pint of milk and a little pepper and salt; then boil gently until it is rather dry and quite soft. Place alternate layers of the rice and grated cheese in a small, well-buttered baking-dish, making cheese the top layer. Put some small bits of dripping on the cheese; brown in a good oven and serve very RELIEVES QUICKLY-CURES PERMANENTLY

A RECIPE for cooking veal cutlets. After the cutlets are trimmed, salt and pepper them and broil them on each side over a brisk fire for five minutes; then place them without delay on a outtered dish by the fire. While the cutlets are broiling prepare the sauce for them: Mix three eggs with two tablespoonfuls of flour, seasoning with a very little nntmeg and salt and pepper; then mix carefully with two cups of milk, and pour over the cutlets, Put the dish in the oven until the cutlets are well browned; then serve.

PICKLED WALNUTS. - Gather the walnuts when the sun is on them, and before the shell is hard, which may be known by running a pin into them. Put them into strong salt and water for nine days, stir them twice a day and change the water every three days. Then place them in a hair sieve and let them remain in the air until they turn black. Then make a pickle of the following ingredients. To every two quarts of vinegar add half an ounce of mace, half an ounce of cloves, the same of black pepper, ginger and long pepper and two ounces of salt. Boil it and put it over the walnuts and

A DAINTY dish for breakfast or lunch is made of slices of fresh crisp toast, buttered very slightly. On each slice put salmon and cucumber, or cold meat and chutney; sprinkle with pepper and wrap each slice in a lettuce leaf that has been steeped in vinegar.

ARTICLES of a delicate blue that must be washed are often ruined in the process; this may be avoided by adding an ounce of the sugar of lead to a pailful of water, and letting the article lie in this for an hour and a half or two hours; let it dry then, after which it may be washed without injury. This is said to be a perfect remedy for the trouble referred to.

CARAMEL PUDDING. - Prepare a mold by giving it a thick coating of caramel sugar; when this has set, pour into the mould a custard, made of the yelks of eight eggs and one and a-half pints of the best cream; steam for one hour and serve when cold.

FOR GOOSEBERRY JAM .- A gill of water to each pound of ripe fruit; boll for an hour. Then add the sugar, three-quarters of a pound for every pound weight of the fruit. Cook slowly for another hour.

FURNITURE needs cleaning as much as any other woodwork. It may be washed with soap suds quickly, wiped dry, and then rubbed with an oily cloth. To polish it rub with rottenstone and sweet oil. Clean off the oil and polish with chamois skin,

A TEASPOONFUL of borax put in the last water in which clothes are rinsed whiten them wonderfully. Pound the borax so it will dissolve easily.

FROZEN cream will not make good butter. Care should be taken to keep the milk in a room or spring house at at an even temperature in winter as well as in summer.

To clean bottles, put into the bottle some kernels of corn, a tablespoonful of ashes; pour it half full of water, and after a vigorous shaking and rinsing you will find the bottle as good as new.
