DEATHS FROM COLL. FIFTEEN HUNDRED PEOPLE ON THE COAST OF LABRADOR.

A Scene of Desolation and Pitious Cries for Food—Women and Children the Principal Victims of the Famine.

St. Johns, N. F., July 27.—Further particulars of the distress among the fishermen of Labrador have been received.

It was reported that in Astoria alone, out of thirty-five or forty families, or a total of two hundred persons, over one hundred had died—mostly all women and children.

Many had come east along the coast in the hope of getting into better supplied settlements.
